11.3 Grant Award, Physical Education Program (PEP) Grant Award

ACTION ITEM

The Board of Trustees is requested to accept the grant award for the Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) project. The first year funding \$554,303, will build a coordinated project that develops the district physical education program so that all 7-12 grade students can meet the goals of the California State Standards for Physical Education. The program design aligns with state standards and a coordinated school health model. The program redesign will be community-based and grounded in sound principles of building capacity for long-term program change. The first year funding period is October 1, 2010, through September 30, 2011. The three-year grant total award is \$1,432,979. (Physical Education Funds) **[EXHIBIT C]**

11.4 <u>Public Hearing, Sufficiency of Textbooks and</u> <u>Instructional Materials</u>

INFORMATION ITEM

11.5 <u>Resolution No. 2010/11-E-01, Textbook and Instructional</u> <u>Materials Compliance</u> (Roll Call Vote)

ACTION ITEM

The Board of Trustees is requested to adopt Resolution No. 2010/11-E-01, for Textbook and Instructional Materials Compliance, per Education Code Section 60119. As required in the Williams Settlement Legislation, the board held its annual public hearing on October 14, 2010, to determine if each pupil in the district has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials in history-social science, mathematics, reading, English language arts, science, health, and foreign languages. Textbooks and instructional materials are aligned to content and performance standards, and are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board of Education. Board members will receive the results of the textbook distribution certification survey, prior to the board meeting. **[EXHIBIT D]**

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the resolution, by a roll call vote.

The Board of Trustees is requested to certify that every student has been issued a standards-aligned textbook or basic instructional materials, in each of the following areas: history-social science, mathematics, reading, English language arts, science, health, and foreign languages. This is an annual requirement in order to be in compliance with the Williams Settlement Legislation. Every school principal was issued a survey instrument to determine and declare that every student in his/her school has been issued a textbook. Once the survey is completed, the principal's signature confirms that his/her survey was accurate. Legally, this certification is required before the district's Instructional Materials Funds Realignment Program (IMFRP) monies can be spent. The certification must be kept on file in the district for auditing purposes. **[EXHIBIT E]**

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees certify the provision, by a roll call vote.

11.7 <u>Agreement, The Regents of the University of California/Family</u> <u>Medicine (For Resident Education)</u>

ACTION ITEM

The Board of Trustees is requested to approve the three-year agreement between the Regents of the University of California on behalf of the University of California, Irvine, School of Medicine (UCI) and the district for services to be provided October 15, 2010, through June 30, 2013. Under this agreement, UCI will station four resident medical students at the district to provide free medical services to district students. The UCI residents are licensed physicians pursuing advanced specializations at the UCI School of Medicine. The program will be housed in the district's nurse's office now located in room one of the Language Assessment Center at the district office facility. The residents' schedules and services will be coordinated by the district's Nurse Practitioner Kathy Strobel. All services will be rendered at no cost to the district. **[EXHIBIT F]**

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement.

11.8 Educational Consulting Agreement, Aeries Software, Inc., DBA Eagle Software

ACTION ITEM

The Board of Trustees is requested to approve the educational consulting agreement with Aeries Software, Inc., DBA Eagle Software, an educational software company, to provide training to Servite High School staff members. Aeries provides the student information system (SIS) software for the following programs: student profile, attendance, discipline, teacher grade book/posting of grades, teacher information, the master schedule, and a variety of queries. Aeries SIS software has recently been updated. Servite High School has requested the use of Title II funding to support the training that is needed on the updated programs. The district is required to extend certain federal categorical program resources to private schools. Services will be provided October 25, 2010, at a cost not to exceed \$1,200. 12.1 Agreements

12.1.1 Keenan and Associates Run-Off Claims

Ratify the Keenan and Associates Run-Off Claims Administration Agreement. California Education Code Section 17566 allows school districts to establish a fund, or funds, for losses and payments, including but not limited to, workers'

compensation benefits for its employees as defined by Government Code Section 53200. The district workers' compensation program for industrial injuries that occurred prior to 1996 was fully self-insured as permitted by the California Department of Self-Insurance Plans. Claims from this period of self-insurance have been administered by Keenan and Associates since the first occurrence of the injuries. The purpose of the agreement is to provide professional claims administration services to ensure compliance with all workers' compensation laws and to provide mandated medical and disability benefits for the remaining claims. The run-off claims are those claims that are open due to future medical awards, in which the injured worker declined offers of settlement and to provide medical services, medications, physical therapy, etc., which are still required under the future medical award agreed to and documented by the Workers' Compensation Appeals Board. The agreement with Keenan and Associates is to renew claims administration services for the run-off claims, October 1, 2010, through September 30, 2011, at cost not to exceed \$8,000, which is unchanged since the last agreement. (Workers' Compensation Funds) [EXHIBIT L]

12.1.2 MAXIMUS Consulting Services, Inc.

Ratify the agreement with MAXIMUS Consulting Services, Inc. to provide mandated cost claiming services July 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011, unless the district exercises its option to extend the term of the agreement. This agreement provides for the 2009-10 mandated cost claims to be filed. MAXIMUS collects documentation and prepares the cost claims for submission to the State Controller's Office. MAXIMUS also provides staff training to district personnel who are involved in the claiming process. The cost of this agreement is considered a mandated cost, and it is reimbursable through the claiming process. The cost of the agreement will not exceed \$37,500, which is unchanged since the last agreement that was approved on June 4, 2009. (General Funds) **[EXHIBIT M]**

12.1.3 California State University, Fullerton

Ratify the agreement with California State University, Fullerton, for student teaching, July 1, 2009, through June 30, 2014. University students will meet with school site master teachers for guidance in the student's preparations for student teaching. This agreement provides opportunities for the student teacher to observe, participate, assist, and teach in the master teacher's classroom for one semester. Master teachers will model effective planning, instruction, and management strategies, as well as discuss these strategies with the student teacher. Services are being provided at no cost to the district. **[EXHIBIT N]**

12.1.4 The Regents of the University of California/Puente Project

Ratify the cooperative agreement with The Regents of the University of California/Puente Project, July 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011. This partnership works to provide a seamless transition for high school students from the Anaheim Union High School District to the University of California campuses through the community college system. Anaheim, Katella, Magnolia, and Savanna high schools participate in this program, and each receives \$5,600 per year. The Regents of the University of California/Puente Project develop the agreement, which was only recently received. The Regents of the University of California will sign this agreement following approval by the AUHSD Board of Trustees. **[EXHIBIT 0]**

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees ratify the agreements.

12.2 <u>Workforce Investment Act (WIA), Title II: Adult Education and Family Literacy</u> Act, Sections 225 and 231, and English Literacy and Civics Education Grant Award

Accept the final notification of the grant award for the WIA, Title II: Adult Education and Family Literacy Act, Sections 225 and 231, and English Literacy and Civics Education Grant. The purpose of this grant is to provide supplemental financial support to the administration, curriculum and instruction, and other services, such as staff development, related to adult students enrolled in Basic Education, ESL, Citizenship, GED, and High School diploma programs. The California Department of Education requires all WIA, Title II funded agencies to administer pre-and post-tests to document significant gains and level completion of all enrolled adult students. Anaheim Adult Education must demonstrate a commitment to serving adults most in need of literacy skills through observable, measurable, and meaningful goal attainment. Grant funds are awarded based on the payment points earned by students demonstrating significant learning gains during the previous two years. The overall goal of WIA, Title II is to assist adults to participate effectively in the education, employment, and civic opportunities available in this country. The total award amount is \$135,993, and is effective July 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011. (State Funds)

RUN-OFF CLAIMS ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT

This Run-Off Claims Administration Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into by and between **Anaheim Union High School District** ("Client") and **Keenan & Associates** ("Keenan"). Client and Keenan are also referred to individually as a "party" and collectively as the "parties."

RECITALS

- A. Client has established a Workers' Compensation Claims Administration Program for the benefit of its employees ("Program").
- B. Keenan is a specialty insurance services provider with special expertise in the insurance and services needs of California school districts, municipalities, health care providers and their related entities and, as such, is qualified to provide the services described in this Agreement and other services that Client may request from time to time.
- C. Client has requested that Keenan perform claims administration functions for the Program as described herein.

AGREEMENT

The parties agree as follows:

1. **TERM**:

The term of this Agreement is from October 1, 2010 through September 30, 2011 ("Term") unless extended or terminated earlier as provided herein.

2. KEENAN RESPONSIBILITIES AND SCOPE OF SERVICES:

- A. Keenan shall provide Client with the services described in Exhibit A ("Services") for all Workers' Compensation claims with a date of injury prior to 10/01/96.
- B. The relationship of the parties shall be that of independent contractor and each party shall at all times remain responsible for it own operational and personnel expenses. Under no circumstance shall any employee of one party look to the other party for any payment or the provision of any benefit, including without exception, workers' compensation coverage. Except as may be expressly set forth in or contemplated by this Agreement, neither party shall have the right to act on behalf of the other, or to bind the other to any contract or other obligation.
- C. Keenan's services are limited to the specific obligations described herein. Client shall remain responsible for all other aspects of the Program. Keenan shall not provide any legal, tax, or

accounting service, advice, or opinion, and under no circumstance are the Services to be construed or interpreted as representing any such advice or opinion. It is Client's responsibility to seek the counsel of its own attorney on all legal issues and to consult with its own tax and accounting experts on all tax, accounting, financial matters relating to it operations, including without limitation the establishment, implementation and cooperation of its Program.

- D. Keenan shall comply with all applicable State and Federal Laws and regulations and obtain and maintain all necessary licenses, registrations and/or permits necessary for the performance of its duties under this Agreement.
- E. Keenan reserves the right to engage independent contractors and/or subcontractors to assist in the performing the Services. The use of such individuals shall not relieve either party of any of its duties under this Agreement.

3. CLIENT'S DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- A. Client, subject to the specific Services set forth herein, shall retain all final authority and responsibility and expenses incidental thereto unless specifically assumed by Keenan hereunder and Keenan is authorized to act on behalf of Client in connection with the Program only as expressly stated in this Agreement. Client shall retain final authority and responsibility for the Program and is responsible for all aspects of the Program except for the Services to be provided by Keenan under this Agreement.
- B. Client shall provide Keenan with all applicable information in a timely manner so that Keenan can fulfill its obligations under this Agreement. Client represents and warrants that all information provided to Keenan shall be complete, accurate and timely and that Keenan may rely upon such information without further investigation or review. Client understands and agrees that such information has not been audited by Keenan and that Client shall remain liable for its accuracy.
- C. Client shall provide Keenan with timely access to such information and individuals including its outside advisors and consultants as may be necessary for Keenan to perform the Services. Meetings, telephone calls, and other necessary communications shall be scheduled at the mutual convenience of the parties and their representatives. Keenan shall not be responsible for any delay in its performance that results from the failure of Client or any person acting on behalf of Client to make available any information or individual in a timely manner.
- D. Client shall fund a claims payment account from which all claims payments and loss adjustment expenses shall be paid. The account shall be established and funded in accordance with written procedures to be established and funded in accordance with written procedures to be established by the parties. Under no circumstances will Keenan be required to advance any funds for the payment of claims.

- E. To the extent Keenan requires the assistance of Client's staff or any third parties who are assisting, advising or representing Client to fulfill its obligations hereunder, Client shall have its staff and these third parties assist Keenan.
- F. Client understands that Keenan is not providing any legal, tax or accounting services or advice and agrees to seek the counsel of its own attorney on all legal issues or matters and consult with its own tax and accounting experts on all tax and accounting issues and matters relating to the services.
- G. Client will comply with all federal, state and local reporting and filing requirements for the Program.

4. **COMPENSATION:**

Client agrees to pay Keenan for the services as provided in Exhibit A at the rates stated in Exhibit B and Exhibit C, all of which are attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

5. **CONFIDENTIALITY:**

Keenan shall keep confidential all information concerning Client and its employees possessed by Keenan, regardless of the medium thereof, except information that is generally available to the public. Except as authorized or required by law or in this Agreement, Keenan shall not release any report, any portion thereof, or any result of any investigation it may undertake on behalf of the Client to any person outside of Client's organization without the express written consent of Client.

6. **<u>AUDIT</u>**:

If Keenan is requested to disclose its books, documents or records relating to the services provided under this Agreement, Client shall notify Keenan in writing at least 30 days prior to the inspection and/or disclosure date of the nature and scope of the request and Keenan shall make available all such books, documents or records during Keenan's regular business hours.

7. FINES & PENALTIES:

Keenan shall pay any fines and/or penalties levied by regulatory authorities that (i) are imposed as a result of the improper denial of claims and (ii) failed to comply with the administrative rules, regulations and state laws governing Workers' Compensation, provided that such actions were not at the direction of or with the approval of the Client; were not the result of the failure of Client or any individual acting on behalf of Client or claimant to timely provide complete and accurate information needed for the processing of claims; or the failure of the Client to adequately fund the claims payment account. Client shall pay all other fines and/or penalties relating to the Program or otherwise.

8. **INSURANCE**:

Keenan shall procure and maintain, to the extent available on reasonable terms, the following minimum insurance coverages during the Term and shall provide certificates of insurance to Client upon Client's request:

- (i) <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. Workers' Compensation Insurance in conformance with the laws of the State of California and applicable federal laws.
- (ii) <u>Bodily Injury, Death and Property Damage Liability Insurance</u>. General Liability Insurance (including motor vehicle operation) with a One Million Dollar (\$1,000,000) limit of liability for each occurrence and a Two Million Dollar (\$2,000,000) aggregate limit of liability.
- (iii) <u>Professional Liability Insurance</u>. Professional Liability Insurance with a One Million Dollar (\$1,000,000) limit of liability for each occurrence and a Two Million Dollar (\$2,000,000) aggregate limit of liability.

9. **INDEMNIFICATION**:

If either party breaches this Agreement, then the breaching party shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the non-breaching party, its officers, agents and employees against all claims, losses, demands, actions, liabilities, and costs (including, without limitation, reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses) arising from such breach. In addition, if Keenan (i) becomes the subject of a subpoena or is otherwise compelled to testify or (ii) becomes the subject of a claim, demand, action or liability brought or asserted by one of Client's employees, Plan beneficiaries, or Plan vendors ("Third-Party Demand") relating to the Services and such Third-Party Demand is not a direct result of Keenan's gross negligence or willful misconduct, then Client shall defend, indemnify and hold Keenan harmless from all losses, payments, and expenses incurred by Keenan in resolving such Third-Party Demand.

10. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY:

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, in no event shall Keenan be liable for any punitive damages, lost profits or revenues, fines, penalties, taxes or any indirect, incidental, special or consequential damages incurred by Client, its officers, employees, agents, contractors or consultants whether or not foreseeable and whether or not based in contract or tort or otherwise, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement even if advised of the possibility of such damage. Client further agrees that Keenan's liability under this Agreement shall be limited to, and shall not exceed, the amount of insurance coverage outlined in this Agreement, to the extent that it is available.

11. **DISPUTE RESOLUTION**:

Disputes arising out of or relating to this Agreement which cannot be resolved by negotiation between the parties shall be submitted to non-binding mediating. If the dispute is not resolved through mediation, it shall be resolved by final and binding arbitration in accordance with the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association, or other arbitration procedures as agreed to in writing by the parties. Negotiation, mediation, and arbitration shall be the exclusive means of dispute resolution between Client and Keenan and their respective agents, employees and officers. The site of the arbitration shall be in Los Angeles, California. A judgment of any having jurisdiction may be entered upon the award.

12. **TERMINATION**:

- A. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon the occurrence of any of the following events:
 - (1) Upon 60 days written notice by either party;
 - (2) The breach of this Agreement by either party if the alleged breach is not cured within 30 days of receiving notice of the breach from the non-breaching party;
 - (3) The dissolution or insolvency of either party;
 - (4) The filing of a bankruptcy petition by or against either party (if the petition is not dismissed within 60 days in the case of an involuntary bankruptcy petition); or
 - (5) If either party interprets the application of any applicable law, rule, regulation, or court or administrative decision to prohibit the continuation of this Agreement or cause a penalty to either party if the Agreement is continued.
- B. If Client requests that Keenan continue to provide services under this Agreement after its expiration, Keenan may agree to provide services and the Agreement shall be extended on a month-to-month basis until terminated by either party. In such case and where appropriate, compensation shall be paid to Keenan as agreed between the parties to the Agreement.
- C. Keenan shall return claim files, loss reports, payroll information and other documents and materials relating to the services provided under this Agreement to Client within a reasonable time after termination.
- D. Upon termination of this Agreement, Keenan shall be entitled to payment only for the prorata portion of the Term during which services were provided. Any monies paid to Keenan in excess of this pro-rata amount shall be refunded to the Client.

13. SOLICITATION OF EMPLOYEES:

During the performance of this Agreement and for one year following its termination, Client agrees not to solicit directly or indirectly (whether as an employee, consultant or otherwise, or for itself or a third party) any of Keenan's employees, contractors or consultants who fulfilled any obligations under this Agreement without Keenan's prior written approval.

14. **MARKETING**:

Keenan may use Client's name in its representative client list. Keenan shall obtain Client's written consent before using Client's name for any other purpose.

15. OTHER RELATIONSHIPS:

- A. Client understands that Keenan or its affiliates may provide Client with other services or insurance coverage not provided in this Agreement and receive compensation related to such other services including, without limitation, loss control services, joint powers administration, insurance brokerage services, obtaining other reinsurance coverage for Client, claims administration, investigative services, financial processing and other related services.
- B. Client also understands that Keenan or its affiliates may provide services for others entities that also participate in the Program and that Keenan may be separately compensated for those additional services. Such services may include, without limitation, providing similar services for other members of the Program or providing other services for insurers or reinsurers under the Program.

16. **GENERAL**:

- A. This Agreement and its recitals and related exhibits and amendments (incorporated into this Agreement by this reference) contains the entire understanding between the parties related to the subject matter covered by this Agreement and supersedes all prior and collateral statements, presentations, communications, reports, agreements or understandings, if any, related to such matters.
- B. All terms of this Agreement (other than Keenan's obligation to perform services and Client's obligation to pay for such services) shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- C. Notwithstanding any provision herein to the contrary, this Agreement is made for the benefit of the parties and not for the benefit of any third party. Enforcement of any remedy for breach of this Agreement may only be pursued by the parties to this Agreement.
- D. No modifications or amendments to this Agreement shall be binding unless in writing and signed by authorized representatives from both parties.

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- E. Any provision determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be partially or wholly invalid or unenforceable shall be severed from this Agreement and replaced by a provision that is valid and enforceable and that comes closest to legally expressing the intention of such invalid or unenforceable provision.
- F. Neither party shall be liable or deemed to be in default for any delay or failure in performance under this Agreement resulting, directly or indirectly, from acts of God, civil or military authority, acts of public enemy, war, accidents, fires, explosions, earthquakes, floods, failure of transportation, machinery or supplies, vandalism, strikes, or other work interruptions or any similar or other cause beyond the reasonable control of either party. However, both parties shall make good faith efforts to perform under this Agreement in the event of any such circumstances.
- G. All payments and invoices are due and payable upon presentation by Keenan. In the event Client fails to pay any invoice within thirty (30) days of presentation, Keenan shall be entitled to receive interest on such outstanding invoice from the date of presentation at the rate of (a) 1½ percent per month or (b) the maximum interest rate permitted by applicable law, whichever is lower.
- H. All notices hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given upon (1) delivery, or (2) when mailed by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid and properly addressed to the party, or (3) on the second business day after sending by fax and receiving confirmation of fax receipt. Notices shall be sent to the parties at the address or fax number indicated in the signature section below unless written notice of a different address or fax number is previously given. If a notice given to Keenan relates to a legal matter or dispute, a copy should be sent to Keenan's Legal Department at Keenan's main office located at 2355 Crenshaw Blvd., Ste. 200, Torrance, CA 90501, fax (310) 533-0573.

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts and by fax signatures. Each person signing this Agreement on behalf of a party represents and warrants that he or she has the necessary authority to bind such party and that this Agreement is binding on and enforceable against such party.

EXHIBIT A SERVICES

1. Claims administration.

- A. Determine liability for claimed injuries and illnesses in accordance with California Workers' Compensation Laws.
- B. Review and process run-off claims in accordance with rules and regulations established by the California Department of Self-Insurance Plans.
- C. Establish files containing medical and factual information on each reported claim together with complete accounting records and maintain them in accordance with statutory time requirements.
- D. Compute and pay temporary disability benefits to injured or ill employees based on earnings information and authorized disability periods.
- E. Determine nature and extent of permanent disability and arrange for informal disability rating whenever possible to avoid Workers' Compensation Appeals Board litigation.
- F. Explain to and assist employees in completing necessary forms for permanent disability ratings.
- G. Review, compute and pay informal ratings, findings and awards, life pensions, and compromise and release settlements.
- H. Maintain and establish reserve estimates for each reported claim.
- I. Arrange for and supervise necessary investigation to determine eligibility for compensation benefits and/or liability of negligent third parties.
- J. Handle excess reinsurance claims on Client's behalf, complying with conditions of the reinsurance contract. Submit billings and collect paid losses in excess of self-insurance retention.
- K. Arrange and supervise rehabilitation services where appropriate.
- L. Arrange for and set up system to pay benefits and allocated expenses in accordance with Client's needs.
- M. Use reasonable efforts to maintain the designated claims examiner's claim inventory so it does not exceed 150 active open indemnity files at any given time.

2. Medical Administration.

- A. If Client participates in the Medical Provider Network ("MPN"), which the State of California approves, then Keenan will select, with Client's approval, a medical provider panel of general practitioners, specialists, hospitals and emergency treatment facilities to which injured employees should be referred. The panel will be reviewed and updated on at least an annual basis. Keenan will work with Client to formulate medical provider panels in order to derive maximum benefit from legislative (SB 899) medical control changes.
- B. Authorize, review and monitor medical treatment required for injury or illness claims. Audit and pay medical expenses through PRIME, Keenan's medical management and bill review program. PRIME services will be billed separately to claim file. See Exhibit C.
- C. Maintain close contact with Client and/or treating physicians to ensure employees receive proper medical treatment and are returned to full employment at the earliest date.
- D. Arrange for medical-legal opinions in disputed cases and confer with medical examiners, Client and legal counsel when needed.
- E. Consult with Client in cases where an injury residual might involve restriction and/or retirement potential.

3. Legal Administration.

- A. When necessary refer litigated cases to defense counsel recommended by Keenan for purposes of defending Client's interests before Workers' Compensation Appeals Board and courts.
- B. Work closely with counsel in preparing defense of litigated cases.
- C. Work closely with applicants and Client's legal counsel to informally dispose of litigated cases.
- D. Protect and preserve Client's interests in potential subrogation cases.
- E. Attend, when appropriate, Workers' Compensation Appeals Board hearings on behalf of Client.

4. Risk Management Services.

- A. Review and update Client on Workers' Compensation benefits, rules and regulations, and legislative issues.
- B. Communicate with injured employees telephonically or in writing to assist them in resolving problems that arise from injury or illness claims.

- C. Meet quarterly with Client to review best practice policies and procedures, recommend areas for improvement and assist Client in implementing improvements.
- D. Produce ad hoc reports as needed to provide meaningful loss analysis to aid in risk management program development and tracking.

5. Statistical

- A. Report to Client monthly status of claim payments and reserves on an individual basis and in the aggregate.
- B. Report to Client quarterly loss analysis of claims filed by frequency and severity.
- C. Provide quarterly PRIME (medical management and bill review) reports detailing savings and fees.
- D. Assist in the preparation of all reports required by the State of California or other government agencies relating to Workers' Compensation claims.

AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE PROFESSIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this 14th day of October, 2010, by and between MAXIMUS Consulting Services, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of MAXIMUS, Inc. (hereinafter "Consultant"), and the (Anaheim Union High School District) (hereinafter "Client"). The parties hereto, in consideration of mutual promises and covenants, agree as follows:

- (1) <u>Scope of Services</u>. Consultant shall perform in a professional manner the Comprehensive State Mandate Cost Reimbursement (SB 90) services as detailed in Exhibit A, incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth as part of this Agreement.
- (2) <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall be in full force and effect for the term as stated in Exhibit A.
- (3) <u>Compensation</u>. Client shall pay Consultant a fee for services rendered as set forth in Exhibit B, incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth as part of this Agreement.

Upon Consultant's material breach, Client may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to Consultant wherein Client shall specify the nature of the default and the effective termination date. Upon such notice, Consultant shall be entitled to the opportunity to cure any such default prior to the effective date of termination.

Client may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon sixty (60) days prior written notice to Consultant. Client shall reimburse Consultant for all reasonable costs incurred by Consultant due to such early termination.

Upon termination for whatever reason and regardless of the nature of the default (if any), Client agrees to pay Consultant in full for all goods and/or services provided to, and accepted by, Client under this Agreement, or any amendment thereto, as of the effective date of the Agreement. In no event shall the making of any payment to Consultant constitute or be construed as a waiver by Client or shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to Client.

(5) Services and Materials to be Furnished by Client. Consultant shall provide guidance to Client in determining the data required. The Client guarantees the accuracy and completeness of the data it provides the Consultant. The Client acknowledges and agrees that Consultant shall be entitled to rely upon the accuracy and completeness of the data provided by the Client to prepare the SB-90 claims. The Client must provide all data necessary to complete an SB-90 claim twenty (20) business days before the claim is due to be filed. Should the Client not provide complete and accurate data in the manner prescribed herein, the Consultant will make reasonable efforts to complete and file the SB-90 claims. In no event shall Consultant be liable for

any missed or lost revenue associated with, or related to, the services provided pursuant to this Agreement. Consultant's aggregate liability arising from this Agreement shall be limited to a refund of the fees paid for the services, regardless of the basis of the claim.

- (6) Records and Inspections. Consultant shall maintain full and accurate records with respect to all matters covered under this Agreement for six (6) years after the completion of the Services. During such period, Client shall have the right to examine and audit the records and to make transcripts therefrom. Client shall provide thirty (30) days written notice of its intent to inspect or audit any such records and shall conduct such inspection or audit only during Consultant's normal business hours. Any Client's employee, consultant, subcontractor or agent who may have access to such records shall execute a non-disclosure agreement prior to being granted such access.
- (7) Copyright for Consultant's Proprietary Software. To the extent that the service and/or deliverables provided by Consultant are generated by Consultant's proprietary software, nothing contained herein is intended nor shall it be construed to require Consultant to provide such software to Client. Client agrees that all ownership, including copyright, patents or other intellectual property rights to the software, lie with Consultant. Nothing herein shall be construed to entitle Client to any pre-existing Contractor materials.
- (8) <u>Insurance</u>. Consultant shall maintain appropriate general liability insurance, workers' compensation insurance, automobile insurance, and professional liability insurance.
- (9) Indemnification. Consultant shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Client from and against damages, liability and costs (including reasonable attorney fees) directly caused by the negligent actions or willful misconduct of Consultant, its employees or agents. Consultant shall not be responsible for any damages or liability resulting from the negligence or willful misconduct of Client, its employees, consultants, or agents or any third party.
- (10) <u>Limitation of Liability</u>. Client agrees that Consultant's total liability to Client for any and all damages whatsoever arising out of or in any way related to this Agreement from any cause, including but not limited to contract liability or Consultant's negligence, errors, omissions, strict liability, breach of contract or breach of warranty shall not, in the aggregate, exceed the value of the contract.

In no event shall Consultant be liable for indirect, special, incidental, economic, consequential or punitive damages, including but not limited to lost revenue, lost profits, replacement goods, loss of technology rights or services, loss of data, or interruption or loss of use of software or any portion thereof regardless of the legal theory under which such damages are sought even if Consultant has been advised of the likelihood of such damages, and notwithstanding any failure of essential purpose of any limited remedy.

Any claim by Client against Consultant relating to this Agreement must be made in writing and presented to Consultant within one (1) year after the date on which Consultant completes performance of the services specified in this Agreement.

- (11) <u>Consultant Liability if Audited</u>. Consultant will assume all financial and statistical information provided to Consultant by Client employees or representatives is accurate and complete. Consultant shall, upon notice of audit, make work papers and other records available to the auditors.
- (12) <u>Notices</u>. Any notices, bills, invoices, or reports required by this Agreement shall be sufficient if sent by the parties in the United States mail, postage paid, to the address noted below:

EXHIBIT A Term and Scope of Services

This Agreement shall become effective on July 1, 2010, and shall continue in full force and effect until June 30, 2011. The Client may exercise its option to extend this Agreement for however many one year terms the Client desires; whereupon, at each exercise, the parties shall negotiate the terms at arm's length.

Cost claims submitted by Consultant may consist of both direct and indirect costs. Consultant may either utilize the ten percent (10%) indirect cost rate allowed by the State Controller or calculate a higher rate if Client's records support such a calculation. Consultant is not required to prepare a central service cost allocation plan or departmental indirect cost rate proposals for Client.

As Consultant relies upon Client to provide accurate and complete information, upon audit, any disallowance of funds paid to Client under the claim(s) for whatever reason is the sole responsibility of Client.

EXHIBIT B Compensation

GENERAL TERMS

The District shall provide to University students, teaching experience through practice teaching in schools and
classes of the District not to exceed the units of practice set forth in the Special Provisions. Such practice
teaching shall be provided in such schools or classes of the District, and under the direct supervision and
instruction of certified Teachers of the District, as the District and University, through their duly authorized
representatives may agree upon.

The District may, at its sole discretion, refuse to accept for practice teaching any student of the University assigned to practice teaching in the District. Upon request of the District, at its sole discretion, the University shall terminate the assignment of any student of the University to practice teaching in the District.

"Practice Teaching" is used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means active participation in the duties and functions of classrooms teaching under the direct supervision instruction of employees of the District holding valid professional clear or life diplomas issued by the State Board of Education, other than emergency or provisional credentials, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the schools or classes in which the practice teaching is provided.

The State will pay the District for the performance by the District of all services required to be performed under
this agreement at the rates set forth in the Special Provisions for each semester or quarter unit of practice
teaching.

A semester unit of practice teaching for elementary and secondary schools is approximately twenty (20) minutes of practice teaching daily for five (5) days a week for eighteen (18) weeks. A quarter unit of practice teaching is two-thirds (2/3) of a semester unit. For community colleges and/or adult schools, a semester unit is approximately twenty (20) minutes of practice teaching daily three (3) days per week for eighteen (18) weeks during regular session.

3. An assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching in schools or classes of the Districts shall be at the discretion of the University, either for approximately nine (9) weeks or for approximately eighteen (18) weeks, but a student may be given more than one (1) assignment by the University to practice teaching in such schools or classes.

The assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching in the District shall be deemed to be effective for purposes of this agreement as of the date the student presents to the proper authorities of the District the assignment card or other document given the student by the University effecting such assignment, but not earlier than the date of such assignment as shown on such card or other document.

In the event the assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching is terminated by the University for any reason, the District shall receive payment on account of such student except that if such assignment is terminated before the end of the ninth week of the term of the assignment, the District shall receive payment for an assignment for nine (9) weeks only. If a student is assigned by the University to another teacher of the District after an assignment has become effective, this shall be considered for payment purposes as an entirely new and separate assignment.

Absences of a student from assigned practice teaching shall not be counted as absences in computing the quarter units of practice teaching provided the student by the District.

- 4. Within a reasonable time following the close of each semester or quarter of the University, the District shall submit an invoice, in triplicate, to the University for payment, at the rate provided herein, for all units of practice teaching provided by the District under and in accordance with this agreement during said semester or quarter. The District shall attach to the invoice a certificate, in triplicate, executed by a duly authorized representative of the District certifying that the District expended or became obligated to expend in providing such practice teaching an amount not less than the amount of the invoice. The University will pay the amount of such invoice from monies made available for such purpose by or pursuant to the laws of the State.
- 5. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this agreement, the University shall not be obligated by this agreement to pay the District any amount in excess of the total sum set forth in the Special Provisions.

INSURANCE

- The University and District shall secure and maintain at all times during the Term, at their respective sole
 expense, professional general liability insurance covering themselves and their respective employees.
 - A. Such coverage provided by The University and District may be afforded via commercial insurance, self-insurance, a captive, or some combination thereof at limits of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Such insurance shall not be cancelable except upon 30 days' prior written notice to the other party. Such coverage shall be primary and non-contributory. Upon either party's request, the other party shall provide a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.
 - B. Comprehensive or Commercial Form General Liability Insurance (contractual liability included) with limits as follows:

1) Each Occurrence

\$1,000,000

2) General Aggregate

\$3,000,000

- C. The University and District shall each secure and maintain at all times during the Term of the contract, at their respective sole expense, workers' compensation and employers' liability insurance covering their respective employee. Such coverage provided by The University and District may be afforded via commercial insurance or self-insurance.
- D. Business Liability Insurance for owned, scheduled, non-owned or hired automobiles with a combined single limit no less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence.

The University and District shall further provide for thirty (30) day advance written notice of any modification, change or cancellation of any of the above insurance coverages.

The foregoing insurance limits and /or requirements as referred to under Section (B) above shall be subject to changes in, or modifications or, coverage, forms, and/or limits as mandated from time to time by insurance programs of the parties. When such changes or modifications are mandates, the parties shall agree to renegotiate requirements for insurance coverage, forms and/or limits within thirty (30) days from receipt of notification by either party of such change. The period for renegotiation shall be thirty (30) days. New contract terms regarding coverage, forms, and/or limits shall be mutually agreed upon by the parties and shall be evidenced by a written addendum to this Agreement within the period for renegotiation. If the parties are unable to renegotiate said coverage, forms, and/or limits, this Agreement shall automatically terminate at the end of the thirty (30) day period following renegotiation unless the parties mutually agree to extend the period for renegotiation and additional thirty (30) days.

The University shall self-insure its activities in connection with this Agreement by maintaining programs of self-insurance as follows:

The State of California has elected to be self-insured for its general liability, vehicle liability, worker's compensation and property exposures through an annual appropriation from the General Fund. As a State agency, the California State University, Office of the Chancellor, the Trustees, and its system of campuses are included in this self-insurance program. Under this form of insurance, the State and its employees (as defined in Section 810.2 of the Government Code) are insured for any tort liability that may develop through carrying out official activities, including state official operations or under an official contract or license agreement, they should be referred to the State Board of Control, State of California, Tort Liability Section, 1515 K Street, Sacramento, CA 95814. Any claims regarding property are to be referred to the California State University, Risk Manager, 400 Golden Shore, Suite 210, Long Beach, CA 90802.

GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement will be governed by the laws of the State of California and shall in all respects be interpreted, enforced and governed by California laws.

INDEMNIFICATION

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 895.4 of the California Government Code, each party agrees to indemnify and hold the other part harmless from all liability for damage to persons or property arising out of, or resulting from, negligent acts or omissions of the indemnifying party.

FINGERPRINTING/BACKGROUND CHECKS

In accordance with California Education Code Section 44320 (b), each credential candidate prior to assignment to District must obtain at their sole expense a "Certificate of Clearance," which includes a complete Live Scan Service. The University will ensure that student's receive a Certificate prior to beginning their assignment in the District.

Urban Teaching and Learning Partnership

Partners

CSU Fullerton College of Education, Department of Secondary Education Anaheim Union High School District

Goals

To develop an integrated methods course and field experience through an urban school district-university partnership for pre-service and veteran teacher learning and practice focused on professionalism, cultural competence and understanding the complexity of urban teaching:

- Professionalism includes the development of a "teacher identity" and the successful
 planning and implementation of appropriate curriculum and instructional practices
 toward becoming a more reflective practitioner who integrates the plan-teach-reflectapply cycle in his/her practice.
- Cultural Competence is evidenced in teachers' awareness and positive views of
 diversity, including knowing about the cultural and historical context relevant to students
 served in the district. Cultural competence is underscored through delivery of culturally
 responsive pedagogy which includes elements of SIOP in supporting long term English
 language learners. Critical in this is the teacher's ability to establish relationships of
 mutual respect with and among students.
- Complexity of Urban Teaching acknowledges the reality that there is no simple model
 for how to successfully work in an urban school environment and challenges negative
 assumptions about urban schools, teachers, students, and communities. This awareness is
 reflected in a positive disposition toward working in urban schools that recognizes the
 possibilities within the students being served.

Structure

CSUF will place one cohort (~30) student teachers in identified high-need schools, primarily in AUHSD and secondarily in neighboring districts, for two semesters consisting of three hours of observation and 1 hour of collaboration with Master Teacher(s) in the first semester (with opportunities for solo teaching later in the semester) and three periods of independent student teaching together with two periods for planning and collaboration in the second semester. Each student teacher works under the guidance of a trained Master Teacher and the observation of a University Supervisor. The UTLP cohort meets for four hours one day a week during their first semester, in space provided by AUHSD, for their general pedagogy seminar (EDSC 440S) taught by CSUF faculty with expertise, both in practice and in scholarship, in urban teaching.

Cooperative Agreement No. 10-PUENTE-HS-01 Between Anaheim Union School District And The Regents of the University of California/Puente Project Fiscal Year 2010-2011

This Agreement is between Anaheim Union School District (hereinafter called Recipient) and The Regents of the University of California (hereinafter called The Regents), on behalf of the Puente Project (hereinafter called Puente).

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, The Regents administer the Puente Project which has established guidelines for Puente high school programs; and

WHEREAS, The Regents possess the capability to provide staff support and training for Recipient personnel who are implementing these programs at their own high school(s);

WHEREAS, the mission of the Puente Project is to increase the number of educationally disadvantaged students who enroll in four-year colleges and universities, earn degrees, and return to the community as leaders and mentors to future generations; and

WHEREAS, Recipient has been selected as a Puente High School site;

NOW, THEREFORE, in carrying out their respective responsibilities, the parties agree to comply with the following terms, including Exhibits A and B, attached and incorporated herein:

I. PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE

This Agreement shall be in effect from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011.

II. STATEMENT OF WORK

- A. Recipient and Puente shall work together to provide a program for educationally disadvantaged students at the following school(s):
 - I. Anaheim High School
 - 2. Katella High School
 - 3. Magnolia High School
 - 4. Savanna High School

During the ninth and tenth grades, students will participate in a class that will satisfy the Recipient requirements for college preparatory English, taught by a teacher specially trained by Puente. The students will be supported from grades 9-12 by a Puente Counselor, who is trained by Puente and employed by the Recipient, and assigned half time to the Puente program. Puente, in collaboration with site teams, will identify community resources to provide students with opportunities for participation in leadership and community activities.

B The current **Puente High School Program Implementation Guidelines** (hereinafter called Puente Guidelines) is incorporated into this Agreement by reference as though set forth in full, and outlines program responsibilities, roles, and expectations for Puente, Recipient, and their staffs in detail. Puente and Recipient agree to follow these Guidelines and the provisions set forth herein in conducting a Puente program. In case of inconsistencies between this Agreement and the Guidelines, this Agreement takes precedence.

- C. The Recipient agrees to make no changes in the Puente model without written agreement by the Puente Executive Director.
- D. Additional programmatic responsibilities for each party are included in Exhibits A and B.

III. BUDGET EXPENDITURES AND FINANCIAL REPORTS

A. BUDGET EXPENDITURES:

The Regents will provide \$5,600 per site for the current fiscal year, for a total of \$22,400. Funds may be used for functions associated with implementing Puente at the site as detailed below, subject to Puente Guidelines. High School site teams and site administrators must collaborate with the designated Puente Coordinator to request changes to this budget.

Approved/allowed Puente program expenses include the following: student recruitment activities, field trips, mentor activities, and clerical/student assistance. Recipient is to prioritize resources for the Puente field trips, orientations, workshops and receptions for parents, mentors, and /or students.

Expenses which are **not allowed** include: substitute teacher costs, indirect costs (i.e. overhead), office furniture (e.g., file cabinets, desks, tables, and chairs), office renovations or constructions, and equipment (e.g., computers and printers).

Payment of the amount stated above will be provided upon execution of this Agreement by both parties and submission of the **Certificate of Insurance**, as required by Article XII. No invoice is required.

If sufficient funds are not appropriated by the State of California for this program, or if funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted, this Agreement shall either be cancelled pursuant to the applicable Agreement termination provisions or amended to reflect a reduction in funds.

B. FINANCIAL REPORTING REQUIREMENTS:

- Recipient will monitor budget implementation on a regular basis and communicate results of this
 monitoring to site teams, and site administration. Additional financial reports may be periodically
 requested by Puente.
- 2. Recipient shall maintain accounts, records and other evidence pertaining to costs incurred.
- 3. This Agreement shall be subject to the examination and audit by The Regents for a period of three years after expiration or termination. The examination and audit shall be confined to those matters connected with the performance of this Agreement.
- 4. Should there be an unexpended balance of Agreement funds, the Puente Executive Director may approve a no cost time extension request. Absent this approval, any un-obligated or unexpended funds left under this Agreement must be returned to The Regents by August 31, 2011.

IV. PROGRAMMATIC REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Recipient will provide access to student and school data necessary to evaluate the program. Such data include but are not limited to: statistics regarding the school's ethnic breakdown, retention/graduation rates, college acceptance rates, and percentage of English language learners. Data should be compiled and submitted to the Puente State Office.

Reports are to include data on students in the program and comparison groups, including but not limited to: GPAs, progress through school, credits attempted/earned, "a-g" courses completed, transcripts, and scores on standardized and College Board tests. Students will also participate in interviews, complete questionnaires, and/or complete other assessment instruments necessary to evaluate the Puente program. In no case will data be collected which identifies individual students without a release form signed by the student and student's parent or guardian.

Recipient will compile the following categories of data and submit the information to the Puente State Office.

- Final transcripts of June 2011 graduates
- Tracking form with results for Puente students, consisting of CSIS (California Student Identification System), CAHSEE (California High School Exit Exam), PSAT/SAT testing, and EAP (California State University Early Assessment Program); 9th grade and 10th grade (only if student is joining program); Puente student bubble/enrollment forms, accompanied by parent consent forms. Without parent consent, Puente staff cannot collect student data, provide directory information (name, address) to college recruiters, scholarship programs, or financial aid offices.
- 9th, 10th, 11th grade enrollment rosters; 10th grade student survey; individual senior information updates; 12th grade roster-graduation verification forms (likelihood of graduation); college acceptance data; 12th grade counselor report.

V. COLLECTION OF INFORMATION

In cases where the Recipient collects information by interview or by questionnaire from students, parents, or the public in connection with the Puente statewide program, the Recipient may not, without prior written approval from The Regents, represent in any way that information is being collected by or for The Regents and the Puente State Office.

VI. PUBLICATION AND ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF PARTICIPATION

The Recipient may publish results of its local Puente site activity provided that such publications (printed, visual, or sound) contain an acknowledgment of participation in Puente, administered by The Regents, and a statement that findings, conclusions, and recommendations are those of the author or Recipient personnel only and do not necessarily represent the view of The Regents and the Puente State Office. Two copies of all such publications must be furnished to the Puente Executive Director following publication. Such publications include sections of larger reports that describe Recipient activities.

VII. USE OF PUENTE NAME

It is hereby recognized that the use of the term "Puente Project" is to apply only to programs that have been authorized by the Puente Executive Director. The Recipient must advise the Executive Director or his designee of any planned proposals which solicit funds for the Puente program or any program which is modeled on Puente as soon as possible.

Any public announcements using a press release must receive prior authorization from the Puente Executive Director or his designee. Any publication produced by the Recipient, which includes a description of Puente, shall use either of the following descriptions, ad verbatim:

"The Puente Project is a national-award winning program that has helped tens of thousands of educationally disadvantaged students enroll in four-year colleges and universities, earn degrees, and return to the community as leaders and mentors to future generations. Begun in 1981, Puente combines accelerated instruction, intensive academic counseling, and community leadership opportunities."

"The Puente Project helps to prepare educationally disadvantaged students for college admission and success through its combination of accelerated instruction, intensive academic counseling, and opportunities for community leadership. Puente is open to all students."

If a more-in-depth description (for example, a brief history of the program, numbers of students and sites served, etc.) or if a deviation from this standard description is requested, the Recipient will contact the Puente statewide office (510-987-9548).

VIII. INDEMNIFICATION

Recipient shall defend, indemnify and hold Puente, The Regents, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of Recipient, its officers, employees or agents.

The Regents shall defend, indemnify and hold Recipient, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of The Regents, its officers, employees or agents.

IX. INSURANCE

The Recipient at its sole cost and expense, shall insure its activities in connection with this Agreement and obtain, keep in force and maintain insurance as follows:

1. Commercial Form General Liability Insurance (contractual liability included) with limits as follows:

(a) Each Occurrence	\$1,000,000
(b) Products/Completed Operations Aggregate	\$3,000,000
(c) Personal and Advertising Injury	\$1,000,000
(d) General Aggregate	\$3,000,000

If the above insurance is written on a claims-made form, it shall continue for three (3) years following termination of this Agreement. The insurance shall have a retroactive date of placement prior to or coinciding with the effective date of this Agreement.

- 2. Business Automobile Liability Insurance for owned, scheduled, non-owned, or hired automobiles with a combined single limit no less than one million (\$1,000,000) per occurrence if using automobiles in conducting research under this Agreement.
- 3. Workers' Compensation as required under California State law.
- 4. Commercial Blanket Bond with a limit not less than the amount of grant funds provided by this Agreement in Recipient's possession at any one time covering all employees of Recipient, including coverage to protect money and securities as found in a Comprehensive Crime Policy.
- 5. Such other insurance in such amounts which from time to time may be reasonably required by the mutual consent of The Regents and the Recipient against other insurable risks relating to performance of the agreement.
- 6. The coverages required under this Article shall not in any way limit the liability of the Recipient.

7. The coverages referred to under (1) and (2) of this Article shall name "The Regents of the University of California" as Additionally Insured. Such a provision, however, shall apply only in proportion to and to the extent of the negligent acts or omissions of Recipient, its officers, employees, and agents. A thirty (30)-day advance written notice (10 days for non-payment of premium) to The Regents of any modification, change or cancellation of any of the above insurance coverages is required. Upon the execution of this Agreement, Recipient shall furnish to the Puente State Office contact listed in Article XIII Certificates of Insurance evidencing Recipient's insurance coverage and Additional Insured Endorsements demonstrating that The Regents are an Additional Insured on the applicable policies.

NOTE: Payment will be withheld until Certificate(s) of Insurance have been received by The Regents.

X. AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/NON-DISCRIMINATION

Recipient agrees that when applicable, the following are incorporated herein as though set forth in full: the nondiscrimination and affirmative action clauses contained in Executive Order 11246, as amended, relative to equal employment opportunity for all persons without regard to race, color, religion, sex or national origin, and the implementing rules and regulations contained in Title 41, part 60-1.4 of the Code of Federal Regulations, as amended: the non-discrimination and affirmative action clause contained in Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, relative to the employment and advancement in employment of qualified individual(s) with a disability without discrimination, and the implementing rules and regulations in Title 41, part 60-741.5 of the Code of Federal Regulations; the non-discrimination and affirmative action clause of the Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974 relative to the employment and advancement in employment of qualified disabled veterans, recently separated veterans, Vietnam era veterans, veterans who served on active duty in the U.S. military, ground, naval or air service during a war or in a campaign or expedition for which a campaign badge has been authorized, and Armed Forces service medal veterans, without discrimination, and the implementing rules and regulations in Title 41, parts 60-250.5 and 60-300.5 of the Code of Federal Regulations; Title II of the Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act of 2008 which prohibits employment discrimination based on genetic information (including family medical history); and the nondiscrimination clause required by California Government Code Section 12990(c) relative to equal employment opportunity for all persons without regard to race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer-related or genetic characteristics), marital status, sex (including but not limited to pregnancy and gender identity), age, or sexual orientation, and the implementing rules and regulations of Title 2, Division 4, Chapter 5, Section 8107 of the California Code of Regulations.

XI. TERMINATION

Either party may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part without cause upon 30 days advance written notice to the other party. Unexpended advance payment balances must be returned to The Regents within 60 days of termination.

Upon Recipient or Puente's decision to terminate program, Recipient will notify Puente parents and students and set in place a transitional plan.

- A. The transitional plan must, at a minimum, designate a counselor who will continue to work with Puente students until their graduation or exit from the school, in order to monitor their individual academic planning towards college enrollment. This will include ensuring that the students are familiar with college requirements and A-G courses, take the requisite tests, and are provided with assistance on the required personal statement and on completing college applications.
- B. The transitional plan must also identify a teacher or counselor who will provide data on the Puente students to the Puente State Office until the students exit the school.
- C. Puente will work with Recipient to establish further transitional plan guidelines specific to the Recipient students and parents.

XII. AMENDMENTS

All amendments or modifications to this Agreement shall be by mutual consent of the parties and shall be in writing.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE RECIPIENT

Recipient shall be responsible for the following:

A. Puente Class

The Puente college preparatory ninth and tenth grade English classes shall be scheduled **during the morning**. Puente is considered an honors class at some sites.

B. Staffing

Staff Selection and Coordination

Recipient will provide the following staff for each high school program. A program is defined as up to four cohorts of one class of no less than 27 students or two classes of 20:1 students each.

- 1. Certified English Teacher
 Teacher's schedule should enable his/her full team participation over a two-year period (ninth and tenth grade English classes).
- 2. Counselor

Counselor should be a full time (100%) Pupil Personnel Services (PPS) credentialed counselor, preferably bilingual (English-Spanish), assigned at least 50% time to the Puente Project. This assignment means, for example, if Recipient considers 400 students a full counseling load, then 200 students or (50%) are assigned to the Puente counselor from general counseling and the 50% balance is assigned to the counselor for Puente students, the parent component, and co-coordination of the program. The 50% non-Puente assignment should not be for coordinating or managing another major program e.g., MESA, AVID, etc.

- 3. Clerical assistance of at least 10 hours a week for the Puente Project.
- 4. Consultations and Prior Approvals
 - a. Teaching and counseling staff shall be selected in consultation with Puente. High School Site Administrator will contact the designated Puente coordinator who will inform the appropriate Puente staff. This required consultation process may include an on-site interview and/or classroom observation by Puente staff. Recipient maintains final selection discretion.
 - b. Any changes in District's teaching and counseling staff for this Agreement must be discussed in advance with the Puente Executive Director or his designee. Personnel changes made without prior consultation may result in the high school paying for the cost of training the replacement staff. This cost is \$2,500 per person.

C. Office and Administrative Support

- Recipient is responsible for providing office space in the counseling department area for the counselor, including a personal computer with access to the school scheduling and student record system, for scheduling and counseling students. Office and equipment shall be provided by the first day of instruction of 2010.
- 2. Recipient agrees to provide office space and a personal computer for the clerical assistance to the program. Office and equipment shall be provided by first day of instruction of 2010.

3. Recipient is responsible for providing access to long distance and FAX telephone services for counselor, teacher, and clerical assistance.

D. Training and Field Trip Days

Recipient agrees to release counselors and teachers, and to cover substitute teacher costs out of Recipient funds, to attend all required Puente training sessions and to take students on field trips to colleges and cultural events. Recipient will provide up to nine (9) substitute days per Puente teacher to participate in these activities.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF PUENTE

Puente shall be responsible for the following:

A. Training

Puente will provide the following staff development trainings and support at no cost to Recipient:

- 1. Puente Summer Institute (PSI): initial mandatory, weeklong training for new teachers and counselors selected to participate in the Puente program. Training program will include instruction on improving student writing, effective counseling strategies, incorporating concepts of community and leadership into the curriculum, working as a team to establish and implement the program, and program accountability. Teachers and counselors will receive reimbursement/compensation in order to attend the PSI.
- 2. Ongoing training for teachers and counselors participating in the Puente program. Training will consist of regional or statewide training sessions and area network meetings as needed.
- 3. Ongoing support provided by Puente coordinators and state office training staff through telephone and email consultations and site visits.
- 4. Teacher and counselor resource materials and community leadership/mentoring recruitment materials.

B. Exemption from Fingerprinting

Pursuant to California Education Code §§ 45125.1(a) and 45125.1(d), Regents' employees are not required to submit to fingerprints. As such, Regents and its employees will not perform tasks, such as school and classroom janitorial services, school site administrative services, school site grounds and landscape maintenance services, pupil transportation, or school site food-related, that require contact with pupils.

Regents agree that its employees will sign in at the Principal's Office upon arrival at the school site and sign out upon departure. Regents also agree that its employees will attend classes with students only when class is in session and in the presence of an employee of Recipient, and that its employees will meet with individual students or with groups of students only in the presence of an employee of Recipient.

C. Community Leadership/ Mentoring Program

- 1. Puente Community Leadership/Mentoring Coordinators, in collaboration with site teams, will identify community resources to provide students with opportunities for participation in leadership, volunteer, and community activities.
- 2. Puente shall provide materials for promoting the Puente program to the local community.

D. Assessment

Puente will provide ongoing assessment of Recipient's program, including: student outcome data analysis; writing portfolio assessment; statewide and local site assessment data collection and reports.

13. ITEMS OF BUSINESS

13.1 Japanese Sendai-Hokkaido Honor Band

Except for districts determined to be fiscally accountable pursuant to Section 42650, no order on the funds of any school district shall be approved by the Orange County Superintendent of Schools unless the signatures are on file in his office and he is satisfied that the signatures on the order are those of persons authorized to sign the order.

The Orange County Department of Education requires that all designated personnel authorized to sign various documents be approved by the Board of Trustees. Since there have been recent changes in administrative personnel, the district is updating the signature authorization.

The proposed change reflected a change in the number of required credits to graduate from 230 to 220 for the graduating classes of 2011 and 2012. The change was approved at the July 15, 2010, board meeting.

On the motion of Mrs. Piercy, duly seconded and unanimously carried, the Board of Trustees adopted the 2010-2011 Grading and Progress Reporting Calendar.

13.6 Revised 2010 Board Calendar

On the motion of Mr. Holguin, duly seconded and unanimously carried, following discussion, the Board of Trustees moved the August 19 board meeting to August 26 and approved the revised 2010 board calendar.

13.7 School Sponsored Student Organization

This item was pulled prior to the adoption of the agenda.

14. CONSENT CALENDAR

On the motion of Mr. Brandman, duly seconded and unanimously carried, the Board of Trustees approved/ratified the following consent calendar with the exception of items 11.8 and 11.10, pulled by Mr. Holguin for discussion.

14.1 Agreement Amendments

14.1.1 UC Regents/UCLA School Management Program

The Board of Trustees approved the educational consulting agreement amendment with UC Regents/UCLA School Management Program (SMP) to work with school site administrative and teacher leadership teams. This is a requirement for school districts that are involved in the federal Program Improvement (PI) as outlined in No Child left Behind (NCLB). SMP will continue to serve as the district's NCLB PI service provider for 2010-11. SMP will work with targeted schools to identify and create structures and processes that assure continuous improvement of both student learning and professional practice. The agreement was originally approved on November 5, 2009, for \$250,000. With this amendment, services will be extended from December 18, 2010, through June 30, 2011, at a total cost not to exceed \$350,000. (Title I Funds)

14.1.2 Joint Powers for Mail Delivery, Amendment No. 1

The Board of Trustees ratified the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) for Mail Delivery, Amendment No. 1, which was originally approved on July 16, 1998. The Board of Trustees approved a JPA that allowed the district to participate in the Orange County Courier Service along with other Orange County School Districts. The entity was established for the purpose of operating and maintaining a county-wide system for

the delivery of letters and other materials, which are necessary for the conduct of business. The Executive Committee of the JPA approved a change to the timing of the reports, invoices, and payments to coincide with budget cycles. Each year, the Executive Committee reevaluates the cost of the delivery service and determines the flat rate amount payable by the participants. Services are being provided from July 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011, at a cost not to exceed \$3,700. This cost remains unchanged from last year. (General Funds)

14.2 Educational Consulting Agreements

14.2.1 Orange County Human Relations Council

The Board of Trustees approved the educational consulting agreement with the Orange County Human Relations Council to provide training to Servite High School staff and students. The district is required to extend certain federal categorical program resources to private schools. The Orange County Human Relations Council will assist in the development of improved interethnic relations. Services include, but are not limited to leadership orientation, task formation, all-day student retreats, faculty workshops, planning and implementation of parent outreach and involvement strategies, assistance in the planning of school-wide projects, student conflict resolution and anger management training, and the Bridges program facilitator training. Services will be provided August 16, 2010, through June 30, 2011, at a cost not to exceed \$6,000. (Title II Funds)

14.2.2 Grover Bravo, DBA Grupo Crecer

The Board of Trustees approved the educational consulting agreement with Grover Bravo, DBA Grupo Crecer, a community-based organization founded by psychologist Dr. Grover Bravo. Grupo Crecer offers a culturally-based family education program to the parents of Anaheim High School students. The course is taught by professional educators and focuses on strengthening the family unit. The course is made up of eight two-hour sessions, each with a different topic. All topics focus on academic success and include the role of the family, self-esteem, and the building blocks of academic success. Services will be provided September 21, 2010, through November 9, 2010, at a cost not to exceed \$25,000. Professional development of this nature is a requirement of the federally-funded Title I Program and such funds may not be used for other purposes. (Title I and EIA-LEP Funds)

14.3 Agreements

14.3.1 Interquest Detection Canines of San Diego

The Board of Trustees approved the agreement with Interquest Detection Canines of San Diego to provide contraband-detection canine services at each school site. This program has successfully lowered drug and alcohol incidents throughout the district for the past five years. Services will be provided August 10, 2010, through June 30, 2011, for a total of 125 full-day visits, at \$400 per visit, for a total cost not to exceed \$50,000. (Safe and Drug Free Schools and School Safety Funds)

14.3.2 Orange County Superintendent of Schools

The Board of Trustees approved the agreement with the Orange County Superintendent of Schools and the district for the implementation of Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) strategies at selected district campuses. In the 2010-11 year, this agreement provides funding for teams from Community Day

School, Anaheim, Katella, and Western high schools to participate in leadership training for the implementation of PBIS on each campus. PBIS strategies utilize positive behavior supports to complement each school's discipline plan with the intended goal to teach students appropriate behavior through positive reinforcement strategies. Each school is allocated \$8,500 to pay for substitutes and consultant fees for each leadership team to participate in these workshops. Services will be provided September 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011, at a cost not to exceed \$34,000. (Special Education Funds)

14.3.3 North Orange County Regional Occupational Program for Use of Facilities

The Board of Trustees ratified the use of facilities agreement with the North Orange County Regional Occupational Program (NOCROP). This agreement allows NOCROP the continued use of facilities, July 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011, at various schools within the district according to the district's approved fee schedules.

14.3.4 Broker Services, Alliant Insurance Services, Inc.

The Board of Trustees ratified the agreement with Alliant Insurance Services, Inc. to provide broker services for the district's self-insured property and liability programs. Alliant Insurance Services, Inc. has served as the district's property and liability broker since July 1, 2007. This agreement renews broker services for an additional three-year period, July 1, 2010, through July 1, 2013, with an option for two additional one-year periods. Broker services are at no cost to the district as compensation is paid by the carriers or pools receiving district premiums. Alliant will not accept insurance carrier contingency arrangements such as incentives, rebates, and contingent commissions, as compensation for broker services.

14.4 Contract, Gasoline and Diesel Fuel

The Board of Trustees approved the Gasoline and Diesel Fuel Contract. The district uses approximately 250,000 gallons of fuel annually, which includes gasoline and low sulfur diesel fuel, for all of its buses, trucks, and vehicles. By combining the volume of seven major school districts on one bid, vendors can offer a lower unit cost than they could to a single district. A bid was processed by the Newport-Mesa Unified School District in cooperation with other participating Orange County school districts: Anaheim Union High School District, Capistrano Unified School District, Fullerton School District, Orange Unified School District, Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District, and Anaheim City School District for the purchase of fuel. The formal bid process was followed per Public Contract Code (PCC) 20111 under Newport-Mesa Unified School District, Bid No. 114-10. Nine bids were issued; six bids were received and evaluated by the participating agencies. The lowest responsible and responsive bidder was IPC, Inc. for gasoline and low sulfur diesel fuel. By participating in this cooperative procurement process, we meet the requirements of PCC 20111 for formal bidding of the commodity. The contract period is for three years commencing August 6, 2010. (General Funds)

14.5 Memorandum of Understanding, Orange County Human Relations Council

The Board of Trustees approved the memorandum of understanding with the Orange County Human Relations Council to provide an intergroup relations program, which includes conflict resolution, anger management, diversity training, and other safe school trainings and presentations to staff, students, and parents. Services will be provided August 10, 2010, through June 30, 2011, at a cost not to exceed \$45,000. (Safe and Drug Free Schools and School Safety and Violence Prevention Funds)

14.6 <u>Membership, Accrediting Commission for Schools, Western Association of Schools</u> and <u>Colleges</u>

The Board of Trustees approved the payment for membership to the Accrediting Commission for Schools to provide certification services for all district high schools. The accreditation process is managed by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC), which is responsible for authorizing a school's certification. Accreditation is vital to a school's certification, as it is required for its courses and diplomas to be recognized by colleges and universities. Students of schools that do not receive accreditation will not have their coursework accepted by higher education institutions. Annual installments of accrediting costs are required for membership in the accrediting association. The annual installment for the 2010-11 year is \$756 per site, and it is required for all of the high schools. Invoices for payment have been received for the following schools: (General Funds)

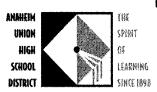

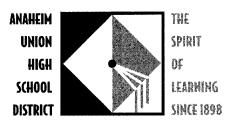
