## 10. ITEMS OF BUSINESS

## A. The Collaborative for Higher Education

The Board of Trustees viewed the video and discussed the unique partnership with California University, Fullerton (CSUF), which is called "The Collaborative for Higher Education". The collaborative encourages junior and senior high school students to prepare for post-secondary learning by completing the university's entry requirements. The collaborative guarantees AUHSD graduates entry into CSUF once the requirements are met. This agenda item provided an opportunity to share the video on the collaborative that was developed by AUHSD audiovisual and public information staff members.

# B. <u>E-Learning Project, Anaheim Union High School District Online Curriculum</u>

The Board of Trustees discussed the update on the district's E-Learning Project. The title of this project is synonymous with the "virtual classroom" or "online learning" and refers to instructional methodology utilizing available internet resources to deliver subject area content. E-Learning courses can be taught in a computer lab classroom with a teacher present, completely over the internet with no face-to-face contact between students and their teacher, or by using a combination of the aforementioned strategies. This report was designed to update the Board of Trustees on the district's progress in making these courses available to our students for the 2009-10 year.

Rene Citlau discussed her experience in teaching courses online. Dr. Navarro stated that we receive full ADA for students registered in four classes on site and an online class.

# E. <u>Educational Consulting Agreements, Supplemental Educational Services Providers</u>

On the motion of Mr. Brandman duly seconded and unanimously carried by those present, the Board of Trustees approved the educational consulting agreements as Supplemental Educational Services (SES) providers. The services are a requirement of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLB), for schools in years two through five of Program Improvement (PI). Brookhurst, Dale, Orangeview, South, and Sycamore Junior High Schools will offer the supplemental tutoring services to low-income students. Parents may select an SES provider from the educational consultants. The district is required to contract with any California Department of Education approved provider that wishes to serve the district's students. (Title I Funds)

The 1 to 1 Tutor, LLC, an educational consultant, will provide services as required by the NCLB federal mandate, November 10, 2008, through May 15, 2009. Each participating student is allowed a maximum of 33 hours and/or \$1,191.08, or the most current state approved cost per student, at a cost not to exceed \$15,000.

## 2. A to Z In-Home Tutoring, LLC

A to Z In-Home Tutoring, LLC, an educational consultant, will provide services as required by the NCLB federal mandate, November 10, 2008, through May 15, 2009. Each participating student is allowed a maximum of 19 hours and/or \$1,191.08, or the most current state approved cost per student, at a cost not to exceed \$50,000.

#### 3. A+ Educational Centers

A+ Educational Centers, an educational consultant, will provide services as required by the NCLB federal mandate, November 10, 2008, through May 15, 2009. # B. <u>Agreement, Orange County Superintendent of Schools' Friday Night Live Partnership Services</u>

The Board of Trustees approved the Orange County Superintendent of Schools' Friday Night Live Partnership Services Agreement, which will provide AUHSD funding in the amount of \$6,500, for the 2008-09 year, to implement student activities that focus on alcohol and other drug prevention services. The funds are designated to pay stipends to the high school advisors of the program, a list of which will appear in the Certificated Human Resources exhibit of a subsequent agenda.

## C. Administration Agreement, Keenan and Associates Run-Off Claims

The Board of Trustees ratified the Keenan and Associates Run-Off Claims Administration Agreement. California Education Code Section 17566 allows school districts to establish a fund or funds for losses and payments, including, but not limited to, workers' compensation benefits for its employees as defined by Section 53200 of the Government Code. The district workers' compensation program for industrial injuries prior to 1996 was fully self-insured, as permitted by the California Department of Self-Insurance Plans. Claims from this period of self-insurance have been administered by Keenan and Associates since the first occurrence of the injuries. The purpose of this agreement is to provide professional claims administration services to ensure compliance with all workers' compensation laws and to provide mandated medical and disability benefits for the remaining claims. The run-off claims are those claims that are open due to future medical awards in which the injured worker declined offers of settlement and to provide medical services, medications, physical therapy, etc., which are still required under the future medical award agreed to and documented by the Workers' Compensation Appeals Board.

The agreement with Keenan & Associates is to renew claims administration services for the run-off claims, October 1, 2008, through September 30, 2009, at a cost not to exceed \$8,000, which is unchanged since the last agreement. (Workers' Compensation Funds)

# D. <u>Piggyback Bids, Purchase Through Public Corporation or Agency</u>

The Board of Trustees approved the piggyback bids as listed. Public Contract Code Sections 20118 and 20652 allow public entities to acquire various products by participating in an existing contract of another public entity, which is commonly known as piggybacking.

Piggyback bids provide an opportunity to purchase the designated items from various funding sources. This is why no specific funding source is designated. Additionally, because the formal bid is described in documents from the original bidding organization, the district is not required to develop a separate bid or contract with the vendor and none is provided or exhibited.

By piggybacking onto another district's existing bid, our district can take advantage of lower costs through economy-of-scale, and also avoid the time and expense of the public bid process. At this time, staff has analyzed purchasing options for office supplies, furniture, equipment, instructional supplies, and audio visual products. It has been determined that the following bids can be utilized to acquire these products at their best value. (Various Funds)

- 1. Newport-Mesa Unified School District Bid #105-07 for Audio Visual Equipment and Furniture Troxell Communication through January 22, 2009. This bid is for a period of up to five years, renewable annually.
- 2. Santa Ana Unified School District Bid #12-08 for Instructional and Office Supplies Office Depot through April 30, 2009. This is for a period of up to three years, renewable annually.
- 3. County of Ventura Contract #4938 RFP #5133 for Office Supplies Corporate Express through June 30, 2009.
- 4. County of San Diego Agreement #519042 for Office Supplies Corporate Express through June 30, 2009.
- 5. California CMAS Agreement #3-04-70-0225H for Computer Equipment Sehi Computer Products through January 31, 2009.

# 1. Parent Institute for Quality Education (Dale Junior High School)

The Board of Trustees approved the educational consulting agreement with Parent Institute for Quality Education (PIQE). PIQE will conduct a nine-week program, consisting of morning and evening training sessions, for Dale Junior High School parents. The purpose of the training is to increase parents' involvement in their child's educational process. Additionally, the training promotes a partnership between parents and the school. Services include telephone calls to all households for the recruitment of parent participants, curriculum development for the nine parent seminars, and required instructional materials, such as binders and lesson plans for the 120 parent participants, January 15, 2009, through March 12, 2009, at a cost not to exceed \$10,500. (Title I and EIA/LEP Funds)

## 2. Parent Institute for Quality Education (Loara High School)

The Board of Trustees approved the educational consulting agreement with Parent Institute for Quality Education (PIQE). PIQE will conduct an eight-week program, consisting of morning and evening training sessions, for Loara High School parents. The purpose of the training is to increase parents' involvement in their child's educational process. Additionally, the training promotes a partnership between parents and the school. Services include telephone calls to all households for the recruitment of parent participants, curriculum development for the eight parent seminars, and required instructional materials, such as binders and lesson plans for the 100 parent participants, January 14, 2009, through March 4, 2009, at a cost not to exceed \$9,800. (Title I Funds)

# 3. Parent Institute for Quality Education (South Junior High School)

The Board of Trustees approved the educational consulting agreement with Parent Institute for Quality Education (PIQE). PIQE will conduct a nine-week program, consisting of morning and evening training sessions, for South Junior High School parents. The purpose of the training is to increase parents' involvement in their child's educational process. Additionally, the training promotes a partnership between parents and the school. Services include telephone calls to all households for the recruitment of parent participants, curriculum development for the nine parent seminars, and required instructional materials, such as binders and lesson plans for the 200 parent participants, January 27, 2009, through March 29, 2009, at a cost not to exceed \$15,000. (Title I and EIA/LEP Funds)

# F. <u>Participation Agreement, Orange County Superintendent of Schools for Medi-Cal</u> <u>Administrative Activities</u>

The Board of Trustees ratified the participation agreement with the Orange County Superintendent of Schools for Medi-Cal Administrative Activities (MAA). This is an annual agreement that facilitates the collection of funds for billable Medi-Cal services provided to students through our district, July 1, 2008, through June 30, 2009, at no cost to the district. As with many of our agreements with other state agencies, it could not be forwarded to the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees for approval until the state budget was approved.

# G. <u>Annual Accreditation Membership, Accrediting Commission for Schools, Western Association of Schools and Colleges</u>

The Board of Trustees approved payment of the annual installments for membership fees with the Accrediting Commission for Schools, Western Association of Schools and Colleges. Accrediting Commission for Schools provides certification services for all public and private high schools. The accreditation process is managed by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC), which is responsible for authorizing a school's certification. Accreditation is vital to a school's certification, as it is required for its courses and diplomas to be recognized by colleges and universities. Students of schools that do not receive accreditation will not have their coursework accepted by higher education institutions. Annual installments of accrediting costs are required for membership in the accrediting association. The annual installment for the 2008-09 year is \$685 per site, and it is required for each of the high schools in the Anaheim Union High School District. (General Funds)
