7.2 <u>Greater Anaheim Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) Community Advisory</u> <u>Committee Honorees</u>

The Board of Trustees will recognize two (2) District employees and two (2) District students who have been nominated and selected for outstanding service to students with disabilities. Greater Anaheim SELPA Community Advisory Committee recognized the accomplishments of Amir Seeyed, senior custodian at Hope School, and Sandy Fernandez, special education teacher at Lexington Junior High School, as well as Oxford Academy students, Carolyn Nguyen and Michelle Jeong, founders and co-presidents of Friends for Hope.

7.3 California Distinguished Schools

The Board of Trustees will recognize Lexington and Walker junior high schools, as well as Kennedy and Cypress high schools for being selected as California Distinguished schools by the California Department of Education. These schools were selected for their strong commitment and innovative approaches to improving student academic achievement. To apply for Distinguished School honors, schools must meet a variety of eligibility criteria, including accountability measures. Once schools are deemed eligible, the California Department of Education invites them to apply to be recognized as a California Distinguished School. This year, the Anaheim Union High School District had the most distinguished comprehensive schools of any district in Orange County.

7.4 Gates Millenium Scholars

The Board of Trustees will recognize Pablo Cruz of Anaheim High School, Brianna Paz Bahena of Loara High School, and Delena Meharenna of Oxford Academy, who have been selected as recipients of the Gates Millennium Scholarship. The Gates Millennium Scholars Program annually selects 1,000 talented students nationwide to receive a good-throughgraduation scholarship to use at any college or university of their choice. It provides Gates Millennium Scholars with support for the cost of education by covering unmet need and selfhelp aid, renewable awards for those Gates Millennium Scholars maintaining satisfactory academic progress, graduate school funding for continuing Gates Millennium Scholars in the areas of computer science, education, engineering, library science, mathematics, public health or science; leadership development programs with distinctive personal, and academic and professional growth opportunities. The Gates Millennium Scholarship selection process requires independent readers to assess nominees based upon the following three major areas: academic achievement, community service, and leadership.

Pablo Cruz of Anaheim High School will be attending University of California, Berkeley, where he plans to study business or accounting. In the future he hopes to become a FBI agent or work for the CIA.

Brianna Paz Bahena of Loara High School, will be attending UCLA as a biology major, with the intent of shifting into pre-medicine. Her ultimate goal is to attend medical school and become an oncologist.

Delena Meharenna of Oxford academy will be attending the University of California, Berkeley, where she plans to major in molecular and cellular biology, with an emphasis on neurobiology. In the future she hopes to be able to work on brain research.

BUSINESS SERVICES DIVISION

10.1 <u>Resolution No. 2012/13-B-14, Temporary Transfer From the</u> <u>Orange County Treasurer</u> (Roll Call Vote)

ACTION ITEM

Background Information:

On March 12, 2013, the Orange County Board of Supervisors approved an action to enable temporary transfers of funds from the County's Educational Money Market Fund to school districts to assist them with cash flow deficits. The borrowing is short-term, and is repaid with principal apportionment receipts. The District may borrow more than once during the fiscal year.

Current Consideration:

Resolution No. 2012/13-B-14 covers the fiscal periods of 2013-14 and 2014-15. The resolution authorizes the Assistant Superintendent, Business Services to formally request a transfer in an amount and on a date as necessary to meet the District's cash flow needs. A sample of the Temporary Transfer Agreement is attached to the

resolution. The agreement will be completed and signed by the Assistant Superintendent, Business Services at the time of the request for a temporary transfer.

Budget Implication:

The General Fund cost of the of the temporary transfers is equal to the gross rate the Education Investment Pool is earning plus five (5) basis points (.0005) applied to the loan amount. There will also be a fee assessed by the Treasurer's office. The estimates are that the fee will be less than \$5,000 per transaction. The Treasurer's office is doing a cost study to determine the fee structure.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2012/13-B-14, by a roll call vote. **[EXHIBIT B]**

10.2 **Public Hearing, Tier III Categorical Flexibility for 2013-14 INFORMATION ITEM**

Background Information:

In response to dramatic budget reductions impacting school districts, the Budget Act of 2009 granted categorical flexibility to local educational agencies (LEAs) for fiscal years 2008-09 through 2012-13. Due to the slow pace of economic recovery, SB 70 extends Tier III categorical flexibility through 2014-2015. As a condition of receipt of Tier III categorical program funding, subdivision (a) of Education Code Section 42605 requires the Governing Board, at a regularly scheduled open public hearing, to take testimony from the public to discuss the proposed use of funding and approve, or disapprove the proposed use of funding for each of the Tier III categorical programs. Additionally, Assembly Bill (AB) 189 (Chapter 606/2011) became effective January 1, 2012, and changed the way school districts must conduct the public hearing for Tier III flexibility beginning in fiscal year 2012-13.

Specifically, AB 189 requires the public hearing to be held prior to, and independent of, the meeting at which the annual budget will be adopted. Furthermore, the Governing Board must now identify any program that is proposed to be closed in the notice of the agenda of the public hearing.

Current Consideration:

As a requirement of receiving Tier III funding, the Governing Board must hold a public hearing. During the course of the public hearing, the Governing Board shall take testimony from the public, discuss, approve, or disapprove the proposed use of funding, and make explicit for each Tier III program the use of funding. The District must identify any Tier III program subject to closure.

Budget Implication:

There is no budget implication.

Staff Recommendation:

Although this is an information item only, requiring no formal action by the Board of Trustees, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees hold a public hearing regarding the District's intent to transfer various categorical program fund balances for unrestricted General Funding operating purposes in 2013-14 and 2014-15 pursuant to Budget Act SBX3 4 (Education Code Section 42605).

Background Information:

In response to dramatic budget reductions impacting school districts, the Budget Act of 2009 granted categorical flexibility to local educational agencies (LEAs) for fiscal years 2008-09 through 2012-13. Due to the slow pace of economic recovery, SB 70 extends Tier III categorical flexibility through 2014-2015. Specifically, AB 189 requires the public hearing to be held prior to, and independent of, the meeting at which the annual budget will be adopted. Furthermore, the governing board must now identify any program that is proposed to be closed in the notice of the agenda of the public hearing

<u>Budget Implication</u>: There is no budget implication.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2012/13–B-13, approving the District's utilization of funds subject to Tier III categorical flexibility as authorized by SBX3 4, by a roll call vote. **[EXHIBIT C]**

10.4 *Public Utility Easement–Cypress High School*

ACTION ITEM

Background Information:

The city of Cypress is in need to efficiently augment the evacuation of rainwater from a neighboring residential development to a main storm drain currently located along Valley View Street. To implement this improvement, the city of Cypress is seeking the authorization of the District to place a lateral storm drain pipe on the Cypress High School property.

Current Consideration:

The underground easement will allow the city to install the lateral storm drain pipe along the north property line of the campus. The lateral storm drain pipe would run under the main parking lot, and between the tennis court and the property wall. The city of Cypress is anticipated to record this permanent easement in June 2013. The installation of the storm drain pipe will be performed in summer of 2013 and will be completed prior to the start of the 2013-14 academic year. Maintenance and repairs of the storm drain pipe will be the responsibility of the city of Cypress.

Budget Implication:

There is no cost to the District.

Staff Recommendation:

The Board of Trustees is requested to approve granting of an underground utility easement to the city of Cypress. **[EXHIBIT D]**

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES DIVISION

10.5 Southern California Diagnostic Center Partnership

Background Information:

Southern California Diagnostic Center is the California Department of Education's primary provider of direct services and assistance to California school districts and their special education students. The Southern California Diagnostic Center provides comprehensive assessments, research-based interventions, quality professional development, and a continuum of technical assistance. They are committed to improving educational outcomes for special education students with complex needs and fostering collaboration among educators and families.

Current Consideration:

The Southern California Diagnostic Center would like to partner with Hope School for a comprehensive professional development project during the 2013-14 year. The focus of the project is to increase teachers' knowledge and skills regarding students with moderate-to-severe disabilities and provide recommendations to support program development. This will be a new partnership between the Southern California Diagnostic Center and Hope School.

Budget Implication: There is no impact to the budget.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the partnership with Southern California Diagnostic Center. Services will be provided during the 2013-14 school year. **[EXHIBIT E]**

10.6 **Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA) Presentation**

INFORMATION ITEM

Background Information:

On September 29, 2006, The Governor signed Senate Bill (SB) 1133, which established the Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA). This action was taken to implement the terms of the *CTA*, *et al. v. Schwarzenegger*, *et al.* settlement, and to discharge the outstanding balance of approximately \$3 billion in Proposition 98 funding that was due, but not provided to Local Educational Agencies in fiscal years 2004-05 and 2005-06.

Schools ranked in either decile one (1) or two (2), as determined by the 2005 Academic Performance Index (API) base, could apply for QEIA funding. The idea was to significantly reduce the achievement gap at schools with high percentages of educationally disadvantaged students. Program requirements included: highly qualified teachers, which meet or exceed the District's average years of service; forty (40) hours of professional development per teacher each year; an unspecified amount of professional development for paraprofessionals each year; sufficient up-to-date instructional materials; meet API targets; a counselor to student ratio of three-hundred (300) to one (1), at the high-school level; and class size reduction (CSR) for a maximum of twenty-five (25) pupils to one (1) teacher per classroom in core content areas. Staff presented detailed QEIA program information to the Board of Trustees at the May 31, 2012, Board meeting.

Current Consideration:

The QEIA program is scheduled to sunset at the end of the 2014-15 school year. Presently, Anaheim High School, as well as South and Sycamore junior high schools receive QEIA funding, and will not be able to maintain class size reduction (CSR) targets in 2013-14, without significantly encroaching the general fund.

Budget Implication:

If the District maintains required QEIA CSR targets in 2013-14, the encroachment to the general fund will be approximately \$1.8 million.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees receive information regarding current status and long-term implications of QEIA.

10.7School Sponsored Student Organizations, Katella High SchoolACTION ITEMand Dale Junior High SchoolACTION ITEM

Background Information:

The Board of Trustees shall give approval for the establishment of all student organizations. The proposed organizations shall not engage in any activities, other than those that are organizational in nature, until the Board of Trustees has approved its application.

Current Consideration:

The following schools have submitted school sponsored student organization applications:

Garden Club, Katella High School Environmental Club, Dale Junior High School

Budget Implication:

Each school-sponsored student organization offsets operational costs through donations and fundraising efforts.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the school sponsored organization applications. **[EXHIBITS F and G]**

HUMAN RESOURCES DIVISION

10.8 <u>2012-13 Third Quarter Williams Uniform Complaints</u> <u>Audit Report</u>

INFORMATION ITEM

Background Information:

The District submits a quarterly report summarizing all complaints relative to adequate textbooks and instructional materials, teacher vacancies or misassignments, facilities conditions, and intensive instruction and services for students who have not passed the California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE) by the end of the 12th grade. This is a quarterly report required by Education Code Section 35186, which is submitted to the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE). Each quarter, the OCDE conducts an audit of the submitted report and provides a report of their findings.

Current Consideration:

According to Education Code, this report is to be provided to the Board of Trustees. The report, as provided, indicates the District submitted an accurate report and was in compliance for the third quarter of the 2012-13 year.

Budget Implication:

There is no impact to the budget.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees accept the 2012-13 Third Quarter Williams Uniform Complaints Audit Report as submitted. **[EXHIBIT H]**

SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

10.9 Maureen DiMarco Award Nomination(s)

INFORMATION/ACTION ITEM

Background Information:

The Orange County School Boards Association (OCSBA) created the Maureen DiMarco award to recognize individuals or organizations demonstrating countywide service in addressing the needs of young people. The Maureen DiMarco Award Committee consists of five (5) OCSBA past presidents, including the immediate OCSBA past president, who serves as chair of the committee. The committee determines whether the award is presented based on a candidate demonstrating the following criteria: exemplary and far-reaching leadership countywide in addressing the broad needs of young people, inspiring others to action in addressing the broad needs of young people, and exhibiting vision in addressing the needs of young people. The recipient may or may not have served as a school board member.

Current Consideration:

The Board of Trustees is requested to discuss and consider nominations for the Orange County School Boards Association Maureen DiMarco Award. The deadline for submission is June 26, 2013. The Maureen DiMarco Award shall be presented at the first OCSBA dinner meeting in the fall of 2013.

<u>Budget Implication</u>: There is no impact to the budget.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees discuss, and consider nominations, as well as provide direction to staff. **[EXHIBIT I]**

ACTION ITEM

BUSINESS SERVICES DIVISION

11.1 *Community Use of Facilities Fee Schedule*

Background Information:

The current Community Use of Facilities Fee Schedule that was revised at the May 14, 2012, Board Meeting consists of two columns, "Direct Cost" and "Fair Value." Direct costs are charged to non-commercial users which include local non-profit organizations. Groups included in this category are parent-teacher associations, Girl and Boy Scouts, and other non-profit organizations providing activities that are beneficial to students within District boundaries. Non-profit groups may use school facilities at the direct cost rate, as long as the use does not "encroach upon the funds intended for the education of its students." Fair value rates are assessed to commercial users (for profit organizations) and local nonprofit organizations when the purpose of the use is to raise funds that will not be deposited into a District account for the welfare of its students.

Current Consideration:

The creation of a "Fair Value A" column will allow local non-profit organizations to conduct fundraising events at a fee lower than Fair Value commercial users.

Budget Implication:

There is no negative budget impact, as the new rate column would help to lower local non-profit organizations' overhead expenses and, in turn, increase the ability for the group to support District students.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends retaining the Direct Cost column of the Community Use of Facilities Fee Schedule, and dividing the Fair Value rate into two columns; Fair Value "A" for local non-profit organizations, and Fair Value "B" for commercial users. **[EXHIBIT J]**

11.2 Agreement, SHI International, Corporation

Background Information:

The District's Microsoft Campus agreement is ending on June 30, 2013. This agreement has enabled the District to take advantage of the latest Microsoft Windows, Microsoft Office, and Microsoft's enterprise client access licensing. This agreement has been a cost effective way to implement Microsoft's enterprise systems.

Current Consideration:

California Educational Technology Professionals Association (CETPA) has a procurement vehicle intended for use by all K-12 school districts in the state of California called the California Microsoft Strategic Alliance (CAMSA) program. The program provides districts aggressive pricing opportunities through economies of scale purchasing power at Microsoft's Level "C" pricing range–a level that requires a minimum 10,000 full time equivalent employees (FTE). This is a California statewide purchasing contract with Microsoft, through a formal bid fathered by the Wasco Union Elementary School District for the Educational Enrollment Solution (EES) program. The bid was awarded to the reseller SHI International, Corporation. Pursuant to Public Contract Code section 20118, the District has chosen to piggyback on Wasco Union Elementary District's bid 059-12M.1 for all of its Microsoft product requirements.

Budget Implication:

This agreement will allow the District to take advantage of the latest Microsoft Windows, Microsoft Office, and Microsoft's enterprise client access licensing to utilize the software, at a cost not to exceed \$118,000 per fiscal year. (General Funds)

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the use of a piggybackable contract for the purchase of Microsoft products including software, applications, licenses, and related, to SHI International, Corporation, pursuant to the provisions of Public Contract Code sections 20118, utilizing the Wasco Union Elementary School District bid 059-12M.1, through November 31, 2014.

11.3 Extension of Inter-Agency Meal Agreement

Background Information:

Anaheim Union High School District has had an agreement to provide meals to Anaheim City School District since the state meal mandate passed in 1975. The meal mandate requires all school districts to provide nutritious meals for all enrolled students who are determined to be eligible. Anaheim City School District, Anaheim City School District Preschool Program, and Anaheim City Headstart Program do not have an adequate kitchen facility to provide meal services to their students at most of their school sites, or in their Headstart/Preschool program locations. The inter-agency meal agreement is a five (5) year agreement, which requires Board approval for renewal each year.

Current Consideration:

A price increase for the elementary school breakfast and lunch of \$.25 is requested to comply with the paid lunch equity requirement of the National School Lunch Program. Headstart/Preschool meals are part of Child Care and Adult Feeding Program requirements and will remain the same. The cost of the paid elementary school breakfast will be \$1.75, and the cost of paid elementary school lunch will be \$2.75. The cost per meal for Headstart/Preschool will remain at \$1.25 for breakfast, \$2.00 for lunch, and \$.50 for snacks. These agreements generate income from the meals served and provide a service to the community. Services will be provided July 1, 2013, through June 30, 2014.

Budget Implication:

These agreements generate income from the meals served. (Cafeteria Fund)

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the meal agreements to provide meals to Anaheim City School District, Anaheim City School District Preschool Program, and Anaheim City School District Headstart Program for the 2013-14 year. [EXHIBIT K]

11.4 Breakfast and Lunch Prices

Background Information:

Anaheim Union High School District Food Service participates in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program. Junior and senior high school students have access to a nutritious breakfast and lunch provided in their school cafeteria every school day. The breakfast and lunch offered to students meet the Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act of 2010. School meals offered to students include milk, fruits and vegetables, proteins and grains; they must meet strict limits on sodium, saturated fat, and portion size. Students can purchase a la carte food and beverages from their school cafeteria, which meet state and federal nutritional requirements for food sold outside the federal meal program. Students who participate in afterschool enrichment programs at their school site administered by Anaheim Achieves receive an after-school supplement at no charge.

Current Consideration:

The price charged for junior high school and high school student breakfast and lunch will remain the same as the 2012-13 year (breakfast \$1.75 and lunch \$2.75). Prices of "a la carte" items sold at the secondary schools are increased according to any increase in cost of goods procured by the District. The junior and senior high schools have the choice of purchasing a complete meal or a la carte items listed on the 2013-14 student price list.

<u>Budget Implication</u>: The price lists generate income. (Cafeteria Fund)

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the 2013-14 breakfast and lunch price lists. **[EXHIBIT L]**

11.5 *Transportation Agreements*

Background Information:

The Board of Trustees annually approves the agreements to provide transportation services to the Greater Anaheim SELPA, Savanna Elementary School District, the North Orange County Regional Occupation Program (ROP), the Tiger Woods Learning Center, Servite High School, and the City of Cypress, Parks and Recreation.

Current Consideration:

The Transportation agreements provide for a net income to the District. Therefore, it is in the best interest of the District to continue the transportation agreements. The agreements will be in effect July 1, 2013, through June 30, 2014. Contracts for each agency will be signed after Board approval.

Budget Implication:

The transportation agreements provide for a net income to the District. Therefore, it is in the best interest of the District to continue the transportation agreements. The agreements will be effective July 1, 2013, through June 30, 2014.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the transportation agreements. **[EXHIBITS M, N, O, P, Q, and R]**

11.6 *Rejection of Liability Claim*

The Board of Trustees is requested to reject a liability claim that was filed on April 9, 2013, identified as AUHSD 13-04 (Tort Claim #320). After review, staff determined that the claim was not a proper charge against the District. This claim alleges multiple personal injuries as a result of a vehicle accident.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees reject AUHSD 13-04 (Tort Claim #320) as not a proper charge against the district, and authorize staff to send the notice of rejection.

Background Information:

educational services at the school, and it serves as a blueprint to improve the academic performance of all students.

Current Consideration:

Each action plan, recently distributed to the Board of Trustees, and available to the public, includes information pertaining to site curriculum, instruction, professional development, parent activities, and budget expenditures.

Budget Implication:

There is no cost to the District.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the 2012-13 Single Plan for Student Achievement, for all school sites.

11.15 *Intranet Network Support Services Agreement, Orange County Department of Education (OCDE)*

Background Information:

Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) provides a variety of services to the District, including data circuit network management, router maintenance, data circuit charges, email archiving storage, and email archiving management. Services are related to OCDE's role as the District's internet service provider (ISP) and email retention storage provider.

Current Consideration:

Intranet services are provided through the Orange County Superintendent of Schools. ISP services are provided at no cost, via Letter of Agency (LOA) with the Corporation for Education Network Initiatives in California (CENIC). CENIC receives funding through the Federal Communication Commission E-Rate program. Email retention storage is provided via OCDE storage hardware.

Budget Implication:

Services will be provided at a cost not to exceed \$750 per year for a total cost of \$2,250. (General Funds)

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the Intranet Network Support Services Agreement with the Orange County Superintendent of Schools. Services will be provided July 1, 2013, through June 30, 2016. **[EXHIBIT Z]**

11.16 Instructional Materials Submitted for Display

Budget Implication:

Increase the amount of this agreement by an additional \$60,000. (General Funds)

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement amendment between Stutz Artiano Shinoff and Holtz, APC and the District to reflect an increase of \$60,000, for a total amount not to exceed \$370,000.

11.18 Agreement Amendment, Parker & Covert, LLP

Background Information:

The Board approved an agreement with Parker & Covert, LLP on August 18, 2011, for specific legal consultation and services, which are not provided by attorneys at the Orange County Department of Education, for a two (2) year term, July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2013, at a cost not to exceed \$100,000. Legal services are provided in legal matters related to Human Resources, personnel, contracts, negotiations, grievances, and potential litigation. At the meeting on March 12, 2013, the Board approved an increase to the agreement, for a total cost not to exceed \$310,000, for the two (2) year term.

Current Consideration:

Due to several major and on-going legal issues that occurred in 2011-12 and are currently pending in 2012-13, staff has ascertained that an increase to the amount of the agreement by an additional \$60,000, for a total cost not to exceed \$370,000, for the two (2) year term, is needed.

Budget Implication:

The increased amount of this agreement is not to exceed \$60,000. (General Funds)

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement amendment between Parker and Covert, LLP and the District to reflect an increase of \$60,000, for a total amount not to exceed \$370,000.

11.19 Agreement, Orange County Consortium District Intern Program

Background Information:

The Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) provides a program for university students to intern at Orange County school sites for the purpose of obtaining a preliminary education specialist credential. This credential authorizes individuals to teach in either mild/moderate, or moderate/severe special education classrooms. Among other requirements, students must attend classes at OCDE and intern in an Orange County school district classroom to obtain their credential.

The District has partnered with OCDE and the Orange County Consortium District Intern Program since 1999. The District has entered into agreements with OCDE programs to provide opportunities for university students to meet their field work requirements and to gain valuable professional experiences. This agreement provides the opportunity for students seeking their preliminary education specialist credential to provide supervised support services to District students and staff.

Current Consideration:

The agreement with the Orange County Consortium District Intern Program is a renewal of the current agreement already in place, which expires on June 30, 2013. The agreement will be effective August 1, 2013, through June 30, 2016. University students will meet with school site master teachers to be involved in the student's preparation for student teaching. This agreement provides opportunities for the student teacher to observe, participate, assist, and teach in the master teacher's classroom. Master teachers will model to the student teacher effective planning, instruction, and management strategies, as well as discuss these strategies with the student teacher. Additionally, professional attire, development, and conduct will be reviewed.

Budget Implication:

The services are provided at cost to the District.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement between the Orange County Consortium District Intern Program and the District. **[EXHIBIT BB]**

TEMPORARY TRANSFER FROM ORANGE COUNTY TREASURER

RESOLUTION NO. 2012/13-B-14

May 30, 2013

On the motion of Trustee ______ and duly seconded and carried, the following resolution was adopted.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District (the "District") desires to request the County Treasurer to make temporary transfers (the "Transfer") of monies to meet its current maintenance expenses for fiscal years 2013-2014 and 2014-2015; and

WHEREAS, California Constitution Article XVI, Section 6, provides that the County Treasurer shall have the power and the duty to make temporary transfers of monies, as further specified therein, upon resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors authorizing such temporary transfer; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Constitution Article XVI, Section 6 and Education Code Section 42620, the total amount that may be temporarily transferred to the District may not exceed 85 percent of the anticipated revenues which will accrue to the District during the fiscal year ("FY"); and

WHEREAS, the District has not issued, nor will issue, a TRAN or other borrowing or any kind or nature for the purpose of funding the District's short term cash flow, which is outstanding in whole or in part, while a Transfer is outstanding; and,

WHEREAS, any Transfer to the District will be made from and limited to the Educational Investment Pool.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does hereby:

- 1. Find and determine that the Transfers are in the public interest and serve a valid public purpose.
- 2. The District Board of Trustees hereby requests transfers of monies from the Educational Investment Pool to the District to cover the District's current maintenance expenses for FY 2013-2014 and FY 2014-2015. The amount of any Transfer cannot exceed 85% of the anticipated revenues which will accrue to the District during the fiscal year. This amount shall be certified by the District and the actual amount of any Transfer(s) will be approved, if at all, in the discretion of the County Treasurer, exercising her trust and fiduciary duties with respect to protecting all of the Educational Investment Pool participants from any principal loss and ensuring adequate liquidity to meet operating cash needs, that such monies are available for such Transfers. The District Assistant Superintendent-Business is hereby authorized and directed for and on behalf of the District to formally request a Transfer in an amount and upon a date designated by the

District Assistant Superintendent - Business, not to exceed the limitations to such Transfer as provided herein.

- 3. For FY 2013-2014, the District hereby requests that the Transfer be made by the Treasurer in one or more installments and not prior to July 1, 2013, nor later than April 29, 2014. The Transfer shall be repaid no later than October 31, 2014.
- 4. For FY 2014-2015, the District hereby requests that the Transfer be made by the Treasurer in one or more installments and not prior to July 1, 2014, nor later than April 27, 2015. The Transfer shall be repaid no later than October 31, 2015.
- 5. It is hereby requested that the Treasurer deposit Transfer installments to the District in the General Fund. All Transfers installments to the District will be made from and limited to the Educational Investment Pool.
- 6. The monies transferred to the District shall be repaid to the Educational Investment Pool from the first revenues accruing to the District before any other obligation of the District is met from such revenue. Compound interest on any Transfer installment will accrue and be payable by the District at a rate equal to the gross rate the Educational Investment Pool is earning for the same period from the date of the Transfer plus five (5) basis points until the entire Transfer and applicable interest is repaid.
- 7. The District agrees to reimburse the County for its costs in reviewing, processing, and administering the District's Transfer request. The District agrees to pay such fees as provided for in the Temporary Transfer Agreement. The District shall pay no more than 5,000.00 in fees per Transfer.
- 8. The monies transferred to the District will be repaid to the Educational Investment Pool from the first revenues accruing to the District before any other obligation of the District is met from such revenue. Full repayment of any Transfer shall be made no later than October 31 following each fiscal year. The District understands and agrees that repayment of any and all Transfers is an obligation imposed by law and the obligation of the District to make payments with respect to such Transfer(s) is absolute and unconditional, payable from lawfully available funds of the District. In furtherance of the District's repayment obligations, District hereby grants the County a first lien and pledge of all District revenues accruing to the District for the purpose of repayment of the Transfer(s).
- 9. The District Board of Trustees hereby determines that it can meet its financial obligations as set forth in the Temporary Transfer Agreement presented to this Board. The Temporary Transfer Agreement is hereby approved and the District Assistant Superintendent Business is hereby authorized and directed to execute the Temporary Transfer Agreement on behalf of the District.
- 10. The Clerk/Secretary of the Board of Trustees is hereby directed to submit a certified copy of this Resolution to the Orange County Treasurer-Tax Collector.
- 11. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

FOR VALUABLE CONSIDERATION, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, ANAHEIM UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT, a State of California Public School District ("Grantor"), hereby grants to the CITY OF CYPRESS, a municipal corporation, duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of California ("Grantee"), a non-exclusive, underground easement to construct, install, replace, reconfigure, operate, maintain, repair, relocate, remove and inspect drainage facilities under and across that certain land in the City of Cypress, County of Orange, State of California, specifically described in Exhibit "A" ("Easement Area") and depicted in Exhibit "B" attached to this deed and incorporated by reference into this deed, together with reasonable rights of ingress and egress to the Easement Area with such vehicles, machinery and equipment necessary or convenient to the construction, installation, replacement, reconfiguration, operation, maintenance, repair, relocation, removal and inspection of said facilities. The Grantee shall provide a minimum 48-hour prior written notice to Grantor before entering the Easement Area. Grantor reserves all rights in the Easement Area not specifically granted to Grantee in this deed.

Grantee accepts and enters upon the Easement Area in its "as is" and "subject to all faults" condition and releases Grantor from any and all costs or liability regarding the condition of the Easement Area, including each and every claim or liability related to the discovery, disturbance, abatement, remediation or placement of hazardous substances affecting the Easement Area.

IF AND TO THE EXTENT CALIFORNIA CIVIL CODE SECTION 1542 IS APPLICABLE TO ANY RELEASE PROVIDED IN THE IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING PARAGRAPH, THEN WITH RESPECT TO SUCH RELEASE, GRANTEE (FOR GRANTEE AND GRANTEE'S SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS) EXPRESSLY WAIVES THE BENEFITS OF CALIFORNIA CIVIL CODE SECTION 1542, WHICH PROVIDES AS FOLLOWS:

A GENERAL RELEASE DOES NOT EXTEND TO CLAIMS WHICH THE CREDITOR DOES NOT KNOW OR SUSPECT TO EXIST IN HIS OR HER FAVOR AT THE TIME OF EXECUTING THE RELEASE, WHICH IF KNOWN BY HIM OR HER MUST HAVE MATERIALLY AFFECTED HIS OR HER SETTLEMENT WITH THE DEBTOR.

GRANTEE HAS BEEN ADVISED BY ITS LEGAL COUNSEL REGARDING AND UNDERSTANDS THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THIS WAIVER OF CALIFORNIA CIVIL CODE SECTION 1542 RELATING TO UNKNOWN OR UNSUSPECTED CLAIMS. BY INITIALING BELOW AND ACCEPTING THIS DEED, GRANTEE MAKES THE RELEASES SET FORTH IN THIS DEED FOR THE BENEFIT OF GRANTOR AND ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES THAT GRANTOR WOULD NOT HAVE MADE THIS DEED WITHOUT SUCH RELEASES.

INITIALS OF GRANTEE'S AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE:

Grantor agrees not to construct any improvements, other than a concrete curb, gutter, walkway and parking spaces, within the Easement Area that would impede Grantee's rights provided in this deed. Grantee will pay costs of removals and disposals, backfill and compaction to grade, repair and restoration of turf, asphalt and concrete sections, landscape and utilities within the Easement Area affected by work performed by Grantee pursuant to the rights of Grantee provided in this deed.

On the occurrence of any casualty affecting the Easement Area, Grantor shall be responsible for any required repair or restoration of Grantor's improvements within the Easement Area and Grantee shall be responsible for any required repair or restoration of Grantee's facilities and improvements within the Easement Area.

Grantee shall indemnify, defend and hold Grantor harmless regarding any claim or liability, to the extent such claim or liability relates to or arises from: (a) wrongful intentional acts or negligence of Grantee or Grantee's agents or contractors; (b) agreements that Grantee (or anyone claiming by or through Grantee) makes regarding the easement provided in this deed or the facilities allowed to be installed by Grantee in the Easement Area pursuant to this deed; (c) workers' compensation claims or determinations arising from employees or contractors of Grantee; (d) prevailing wage claims relating to employees or contractors of Grantee; (e) hazardous substance discharges caused in whole or in part by Grantee or Grantee's agents or contractors; (f) this deed; (g) conditions of the Easement Area created or allowed by Grantee or Grantee's agents or contractors; or (h) discovery, disturbance, abatement, remediation or placement of hazardous substances affecting the Easement Area or adjacent land of Grantor. The foregoing indemnity, defense and hold harmless obligations shall include, without limitation,

payment of attorneys' fees and court costs incurred by Grantor in connection with any indemnified matter or enforcing the indemnity, defense and hold harmless obligations of Grantee. The indemnity, defense and hold harmless obligations of Grantee set forth in this paragraph shall survive any termination or abandonment of the Easement Area or this deed.

Nothing contained in this deed is intended to constitute a dedication of the Easement Area or any other property for public use. The easement rights provided in this deed are only for the benefit of Grantee and are not appurtenant to any land.

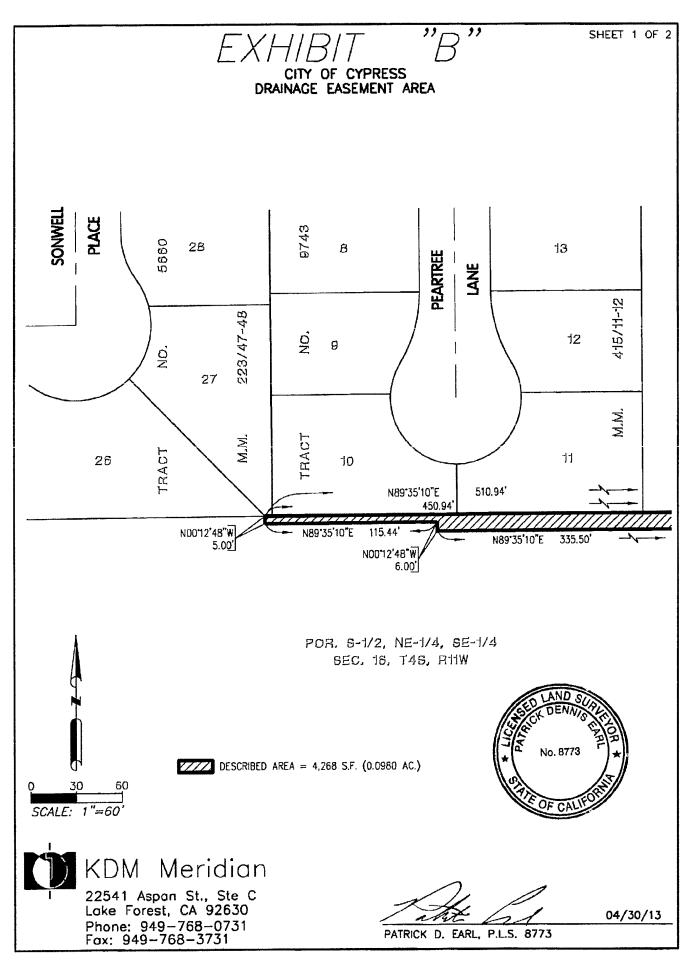

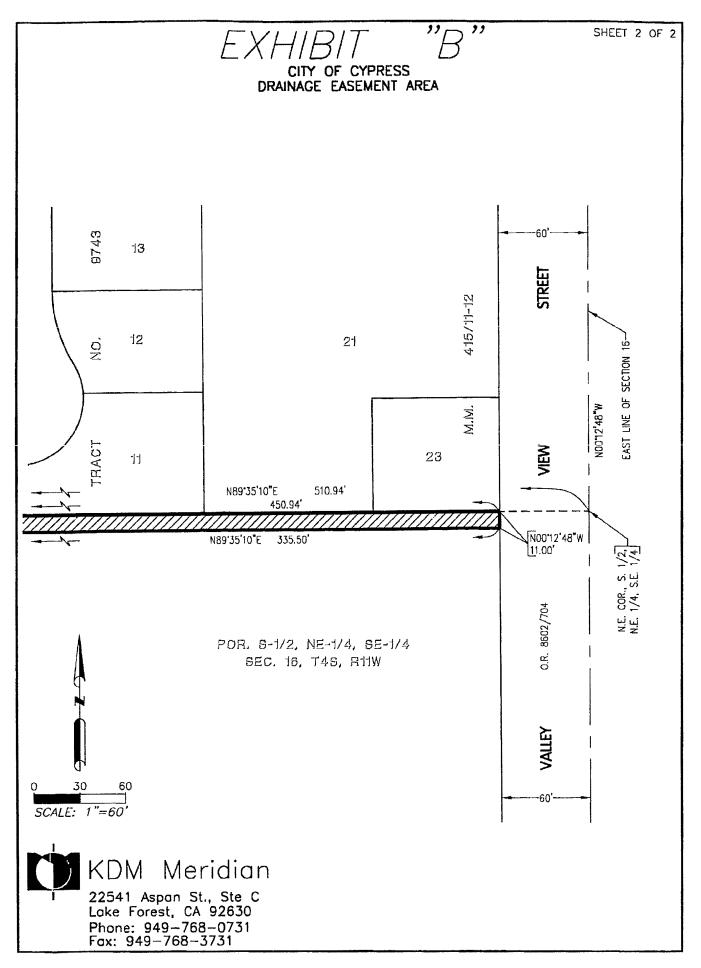

### 2013-2016 INTRANET NETWORK SUPPORT SERVICES AGREEMENT ANAHEIM UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT

This Intranet Network Support Services Agreement is hereby entered into this 14th day of January, 2013, by and between the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, 200 Kalmus Drive, Costa Mesa, California 92626, hereinafter referred to as SUPERINTENDENT, and Anaheim Union High School District, 501 Crescent Way, Anaheim, California 92801, hereinafter referred to as DISTRICT. SUPERINTENDENT and DISTRICT shall be collectively referred to as the Parties.

SUPERINTENDENT'S technical support via telephone shall be provided to DISTRICT without charge Monday through Friday from 8:00 A.M. - 5:00 P.M., excluding SUPERINTENDENT'S holidays.

6.0 <u>TRAINING</u>. SUPERINTENDENT will provide, at no additional charge, such assistance and advice, if requested, as may be necessary to assist DISTRICT personnel in the use and operation of the equipment installed by SUPERINTENDENT to enable DISTRICT to make

Other districts participating in the Orange County Consortium include, but are not limited to: Anaheim City School District, Brea-Olinda Unified School District, Buena Park School District, Capistrano Unified School District, Corona-Norco Unified School District, Fountain Valley School District, Fullerton Joint Union High School District, Fullerton School District, Garden Grove Unified School District, Huntington Beach Union High School District, Irvine Unified School District, LACOE (L.A. County Office of Education), Magnolia School District, Newport-Mesa Unified School District, Ocean View School District, Orange Unified School District, Orange County Dept. of Education Alternative Education ACCESS, Santa Ana Unified School District, Westminster School District, and non-public schools.

In addition, this MOU is entered into by and between Azusa Pacific University; Chapman University; University of California, Irvine; California State University, Fullerton; Concordia University; National University; Vanguard University; and other Institutions of Higher Education (IHE) to form a Consortium to implement the Orange County Consortium District Intern Program.

## A. PURPOSE

The purpose of the MOU is to establish a formal working relationship between the parties to this MOU and to set forth the operative conditions that will govern the District Intern Program for the Education Specialist Credential. SUPERINTENDENT, participating school districts, and participating institutions of higher education will form a Countywide Consortium to provide and coordinate services of the District Intern Program.

## B. PARAMETERS

- 1. Starting and ending dates of the three years of implementation: The beginning date is <u>August 1, 2013</u>, and the concluding date is <u>June 30, 2016</u>.
- 2. Contract and monitoring responsibilities for the MOU shall rest with the SUPERINTENDENT.
- C. RESPONSIBILITIES General
- 1. Participating school districts agree to the following:
  - a. Appoint a representative who will serve as a consortium member on the Institute for Leadership Development Advisory Council. (Education Code 44227(a))
  - b. Select and recommend intern teachers for participation in the District Intern Program according to the criteria established by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing using the application approved by the Countywide Consortium. (Education Code 44458)

Per Education Code 44325c, ensure that district intern teacher candidates entering the District Intern Program meet the following requirements:

- Baccalaureate or higher degree from a regionally accredited institution of higher education with a 2.75 G.P.A.
- Passage of the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST)
- Meet Subject Matter Competency requirements
- Have Pre-Service coursework

c.

• Certificate of Clearance (Education Code 44320(d))

Once the district offers the intern a contract, the Human Resources/Personnel Administrator or designee signs the "<u>Orange County Consortium District Intern Program Requirements and School District</u> <u>Recommendation</u>" form, to be included with the intern's application for an Intern Credential.

In addition to the MOU, the district submits to the District Intern Program Office a signed, current <u>Co-Sponsor Page</u>, which is sent to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC).

- d. Per Education Code 44326d and 44830.3a, the participating school district will assign, at no cost to the Orange County Department of Education, a peer coach to mentor the intern teacher using the criteria provided. The peer coach (mentor) assigned should have a teaching credential appropriate to the assignment. The principal will be responsible for overseeing and supporting the district intern teacher throughout the program. The peer coach (mentor) will offer weekly support to the district intern teacher, attend trainings (if appropriate), and attend one District Intern Program meeting annually.
- e. Anaheim Union High School District will allow the Intern teacher to conduct the observations he/she is required to conduct but will not provide substitute coverage for the intern. The intern teacher will need to complete these observations either through the use of prep time or other scheduling that will not incur additional costs to the district.
- f. The site administrator will agree to negotiate the intern teacher's extracurricular and committee assignment workload, if necessary, in consideration that the teacher is an intern in training. The intern teacher is required to attend approximately five all-day Saturday classes per semester, late afternoon-evening classes once a week during the program, and must spend approximately 10 hours per week in study and preparation for classes.
- g. Require district intern teachers to attend and participate in the prescribed course of study, workshops, and professional development to become qualified for an Education Specialist Credential.
- h. Agree to allow a practicum supervisor to visit the district intern teacher in her/his classroom a minimum of five (5) times for three semesters.
- i. Agree that salary schedule credit for District Intern Program participation will be accepted dependent upon individual district collective bargaining contracts. According to Education Code 44327a, "each school district with a district intern program is responsible for maintaining appropriate records of the program so that the credit earned by each district intern is transferable to his or her academic record in the same manner as if the intern had participated in a college or university program."

- j. Agree that district intern teachers who fail to meet the teaching performance standards, attendance, and G.P.A. requirements established in collaboration between SUPERINTENDENT and the district in which the district intern teacher teaches, will be referred to the district's human resources administrator for review and recommendations. A district intern teacher who fails to retain employment status cannot remain in the District Intern Program. A letter from the existing district intern teacher must be submitted to the program director indicating his/her withdrawal from the District Intern Program.
- k. Assist the intern teacher with the application for a District Intern Credential, which is submitted to the District Intern Program Office for additional signatures.
- 1. Participate in the program and intern evaluation, as required by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing and Education Code 44325-44329, 44830.3 and 44885.5.
- m. The program recommends that the district employees serving as district intern teachers, who successfully complete this internship program and meet the criteria of the Commission on the Teacher Credentialing, be granted a Preliminary Education Specialist Credential.
- n. Salaries will be the same as paid to other certified personnel and will not be reduced to pay for supervision or release time for classes. (Education Code 44462)
- o. District agrees to assign candidates to assume the functions authorized by the teaching or education specialist credential. Interns will teach only in the subject area in which they intend to be licensed. (Education Code 44454)
- p. District certifies that interns are not displacing certificated employees. (CCTC Preconditions)
- q. District agrees to the guidelines as established with Senate Bill 1209.
- 2. SUPERINTENDENT agrees to the following:
  - a. Identify a program director that will convene the Countywide Consortium and manage the ongoing activities of the District Intern Program.
  - b. Provide secretarial support for the administration of the District Intern Program.
  - c. Provide workspace for the program director and coordinator, office support services, and meeting space for program activities.
  - d. Develop and establish contracts with outside vendors for professional services which may include, but are not limited, to:
    - 1. Instructional and professional development services
    - 2. Test preparation services
    - 3. Evaluation services
  - e. Provide a process for equitable distribution of services to district intern teachers and peer coaches in all participating districts.
  - f. Establish and maintain accurate records and reports. Maintain a locked confidential file to store all information on participating district intern teachers involving individual formative assessments and progress.

- g. Supply to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing and California State Department of Education reports and other information, as requested, on all matters related to the District Intern Program requirements and activities.
- h. Participate in the District Intern Program evaluation.
- i. Recommend that district intern teachers who successfully complete all criteria of the program are granted a Preliminary Education Specialist Credential.
- 3. Participating Institutions of Higher Education (IHE) agree to the following:
  - a. Appoint a consortium representative who will serve on the Institute for Leadership Development Advisory Council and attend up to three meetings a year.
  - b. Provide advisement opportunities to district intern teachers regarding participation in advanced levels of education, intern, and teacher training programs.
  - c. Provide current research regarding instructional strategies, curriculum, classroom management, and instructional technology.
  - d. Provide library-borrowing privileges for district intern teachers.
- D. RESPONSIBILITIES Fiscal
- 1. SUPERINTENDENT in its capacity of LEA, agrees to the following:
  - a. Overall fiscal responsibility for the administration of the grant funds, to include submission of year-end expenditure reports, and any other documentation sought by the California Department of Education and/or Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
  - b. Develop and maintain a budget that meets the costs of implementing program responsibilities.
  - c. Expend income according to regularly established policies and procedures of the funding agency.
- E. TERMS AND CONDITIONS
  - 1. Any and all products developed for the Orange County District Intern Program are the exclusive property of the Orange County Superintendent of Schools and the right to disseminate, market, or otherwise use the products shall only be with the express written permission of SUPERINTENDENT.

## 10.2 Resolution No. 2012/13-BOT-04, California Public School Funding

#### Background Information:

In January 2013, Governor Brown released his annual January budget proposal. Within this proposal was a continuing pursuit for education finance reform. Governor Brown's proposed reform, known as Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), will fund districts through a base grant with additional supplemental funding (a percentage of the base grant) based on English language learners, economically disadvantaged youth, (i.e., free and reduced price lunch) and foster youth; districts with 50 percent of the subgroups will receive a concentration grant that is also a percentage of the base grant. The intent is to replace the vast majority of existing revenue limit and categorical funding of formulas with a new, streamlined set of funding formulas—one (1) applying to school district and charter schools and the other applying to county offices of education.

#### Current Consideration:

Given the current climate regarding California public school finance and the proposed formula changes, there is an interest to engage in a conversation regarding the implications for AUHSD and the Local Control Funding Formula.

#### Budget Implication:

The implication to the budget is uncertain at this time.

## 10.3 *Learning Summit*

#### Background Information:

The superintendent and the Educational Services Division has been providing an overview to the Board of Trustees on learning initiatives and progress for the District. The Learning Summit began with a study session in 2012. The District reviewed the learning initiatives to create a better understanding in greater detail.

#### Current Consideration:

This year, the learning summit will focus on depths of implementation.
